Opening Verse of Scripture

Matthew 11:28

"Come to me, all you who are weary and burdened, and I will give you rest. Take my yoke upon you and learn from me, for I am gentle and humble in heart, and you will find rest for your souls."

First Bible Reading Isaiah Chapter 66:10-14

"Rejoice with Jerusalem and be glad for her, all you who love her; rejoice greatly with her, all you who mourn over her. For you will nurse and be satisfied at her comforting breasts; you will drink deeply and delight in her overflowing abundance." For this is what the LORD says: "I will extend peace to her like a river, and the wealth of nations like a flooding stream; you will nurse and be carried on her arm and dandled on her knees. As a mother comforts her child, so will I comfort you; and you will be comforted over Jerusalem." When you see this, your heart will rejoice and you will flourish like grass; the hand of the LORD will be made known to his servants, but his fury will be shown to his foes. (Reader: This is the word of the Lord - All: **Thanks be to God**)

Second Reading Galatians Chapter 6:7-16

Do not be deceived: God cannot be mocked. A man reaps what he sows.

The one who sows to please his sinful nature, from that nature will reap destruction; the one who sows to please the Spirit, from the Spirit will reap eternal life. Let us not become weary in doing good, for at the proper time we will reap a harvest if we do not give up. Therefore, as we have opportunity, let us do good to all people, especially to those who belong to the family of believers. See what large letters I use as I write to you with my own hand! Those who want to make a good impression outwardly are trying to compel you to be circumcised. The only reason they do this is to avoid being persecuted for the cross of Christ. Not even those who are circumcised obey the law, yet they want you to be circumcised that they may boast about your flesh. May I never boast except in the cross of our Lord Jesus Christ, through which the world has been crucified to me, and I to the world. Neither circumcision nor uncircumcision means anything; what counts is a new creation. Peace and mercy to all who follow this rule, even to the Israel of God. (Reader: This is the word of the Lord - All: **Thanks be to God**)

Gospel Reading Luke 10:1-11, 16-20

After this the Lord appointed seventy-two others and sent them two by two ahead of him to every town and place where he was about to go. He told them, "The harvest is plentiful, but the workers are few. Ask the Lord of the harvest, therefore, to send out workers into his harvest field. Go! I am sending you out like lambs among wolves. Do not take a purse or bag or sandals; and do not greet anyone on the road. "When you enter a house, first say, 'Peace to this house.' If a man of peace is there, your peace will rest on him; if not, it will return to you. Stay in that house, eating and drinking whatever they give you, for the worker deserves his wages. Do not move around from house to house. "When you enter a town and are welcomed, eat what is set before you. Heal the sick who are there and tell them, 'The kingdom of God is near you.' But when you enter a town and are not welcomed, go into its streets and say, 'Even the dust of your town that sticks to our feet we wipe off against you. Yet be sure of this: The kingdom of God is near.'

Commentary Farmers always seem to moan about the weather, whatever the weather! Timing the right procedures to coincide with the appropriate weather is the difference between crop failure and success, between starvation and plenty. When Jesus used the metaphor of His missionaries as being like harvesters, he was conveying to His hearers the importance and absolute urgency of their task. If the Kingdom was to be advanced, if the message of salvation was to be spread, the missionaries had to work hard and fast, with the desperate speed of farmers gathering the crops before rain. The blood of the eager disciples must have chilled to hear themselves described as being like lambs in the midst of wolves. This simile speaks of dangers to the body and the soul and of their helplessness to defend themselves from it. And so the disciples are both powerful and important because of the imperative nature of their call, but at the same time weak and vulnerable. Jesus was pointing up the great truth that both their power and their safety was not of themselves, did not depend on them, but on the love and power of God, the Holy Spirit. We also need the reminder that everything we have comes from God and that only He can guard us from the dangers, spiritual and moral which surround us. Joan Crossley

Meditation

Corrie ten Boom was arrested by the Gestapo in February 1944 and sent to Ravensbruck Concentration Camp. Years later, while speaking in Church, she saw the former SS guard who had tortured and humiliated her sister. After the service he came up to her "smiling broadly and with outstretched hand "Thank you for the message" he said. "Jesus has washed my sins away". Corrie was stunned into silence. She had preached forgiveness, but could she show it, feel it towards the person who had caused such harm to her sister? For a long moment, she paused, then prayed silently. "Lord Jesus, forgive me and help me to forgive him." As she took his hand, Corrie felt an amazing current passing from herself to the former Gestapo guard and love filled her heart. So she concluded. "I discovered that when God tells us to love our enemies he gives, along with the commandment, the love itself." (Corrie ten Boom)

Father, may everything we do begin with your inspiration and continue with your saving help. Let our work always find its origin in you and through you reach completion. Amen

The following is an extract taken from the sermon by the Bishop of St Albans at the Installation of the Dean of St Albans Cathedral and Abbey Church of St Alban: 2 July 2004

Love, because you can only venture on the journey home if love is your guiding principle - that is, a vulnerability and risky openness to whatever the journey brings - and faith, because we believe that **all** human beings have value, dignity and worth. That is not a provable set of propositions; they are self-authenticating for the humanist and they are authenticated by God for the Christian.

One of Jeffrey's phrases which is full of insight is about evangelism, about the mission of the Church. He calls it 'bringing people home to God.' Perhaps now you can see why I quoted that piece about the purpose of drama, *nostos*, a journey home. But you may also see why I have talked of emotional truthfulness, intelligence and a burning imagination - and have also talked at the beginning of this sermon of 'call and consequence'.

Jeffrey's answer to the call to come to St Albans as Dean rested on a word. My rôle in the process, the third in the combination of Prime Minister and Crown also rested on a word, 'yes' or 'no'. Jeffrey John's courage in saying his 'yes' should never, ever, be underestimated - knowing what the reactions in the Church and media might be. It was a decision very, very few of us ever have to make, so we can only imperfectly imagine the process.

I have been aware during the process and since that the reactions to the appointment would be very mixed. There are very, very many who are absolutely thrilled; and there are some of my fellow Christians who have been (and remain) deeply upset, angry and dismayed. As I said in my recent address at Diocesan Synod, and on other occasions. what we have to do is listen deeply and patiently to each other, so that understanding on all sides may grow.

The letters have poured in from all sides, from those rejoicing and from those who are hurt - and both 'sides', let me say as strongly and forcefully as I can, believe that they are acting out of the highest Christian motives and for the most serious of Christian reasons which means that as Christians, we are in this together. And,

let me repeat, what we have to commit ourselves to doing is to learn from, understand, respect and love each other, as brothers and sisters in Christ - and that will take patience and time, grace and truthfulness; but above all, it will take love and faith, rooted in and growing out of Christ.

So, here we are now, in this Abbey - a place which is 'home' to thousands upon thousands, a place which is enormously welcoming and accepting, which takes Alban's 'yes' to the Amphibaluses of this world with great and loving seriousness. The 'journey home' is lived and experienced within these hallowed walls - and it is part of the calling of a dean, not only to be himself 'at home' here and to ensure that others may feel the same, but also to take the truths represented in this place and in Christ, Himself, into the marketplace of the world. And in our world, what is looked for, above all, are individual people who take call and consequence seriously, who struggle with the beauty and the demands of God - and who do so with a kind of wounded but faithful integrity. And what is looked for in the Church is that collectively we may also be seen to be struggling with the beauty and the demands of God - and doing so, collectively, with wounded and faithful integrity.

All sermons require a biblical text. Here is mine, on this great and courageous and hope-filled day: Ephesians 1:17-19:

I pray that the God of our Lord Jesus Christ, the Father of glory, may give you a spirit of wisdom and of revelation as you come to know him, so that, with the eyes of your heart enlightened, you may know what is the hope to which he has called you, what are the riches of his glorious inheritance among the saints, and what is the immeasurable greatness of his power for us who believe, according to the working of his great power.

Jeffrey John - that is my prayer for you as Dean; it is my prayer for this lovely Abbey; it is my prayer for our diocese - and for all who live within its boundaries. It is my prayer for our world. It all hangs on a word: and that word is Christ's 'yes' to us from his Cross and in his Resurrection.

A Yorkshire Vicar who caused controversy by asking for "paper money only" in the collection at a wedding defended his decision this week. The Revd Mark Sowerby, Vicar of St Wilfrid's, Harrogate, admitted to being "fed up" with counting coppers after weddings in an area that could contribute more to help the upkeep of the Grade-I listed building. He said, however, that he might reconsider how he conveys his message. His instruction to wedding guests had been printed in the order of service — and not stuck to the collection plate, as had been widely reported. "At a typical wedding here of, say, 120 people, we were literally receiving between £5 and £15 in small change. The parish is a mixed area, but it is one of the most affluent in the diocese of Ripon & Leeds."

Mr Sowerby said that he did not see weddings in terms of paying bills. "I stick by the principle of what happened, but obviously did not intend to cause upset. Anything less than the cost of a pint does not seem a worthy contribution." The bride at the wedding where Mr Sowerby made the request last month was reported as saying: "It was my big day, cost a lot of money, took a lot organising, and the Vicar ruined it."

Faith Meeting Faith, a new publication aiming to counter fears about relating to other religions, and pave the way forward in Inter Faith relations, will be launched at the Methodist Conference next week. The 72-page booklet reflects on the questions Christians are asking, such as 'is Britain ceasing to be a Christian country?' and 'can Christians pray and worship together with people of other faiths?' Thirty questions are considered and explored, before suggestions are made for the best 'ways forward'. Organising visits to the places of worship of people of other faiths, taking action to improve the human rights of people of every background, and even reading an English translation of the Qur'an, are some of the proposed ways forward. The Archbishop of Canterbury, Dr Rowan Williams, recommended the handbook by saying: "An impressive feature of *Faith Meeting Faith* is the sensitivity and intelligence with which the diversity of views among Christians about key issues is acknowledged. All Christians should find that their views and concerns are taken seriously here; equally, all should find that they are challenged to think afresh." *Faith Meeting Faith* is written for Christians by Christians in order to help us discover the right ways forward for inter faith relations."
