Collect Payer for the Day - Before we read we pray

Almighty God, whose most dear Son went not up to joy but first he suffered pain, and entered not into glory before he was crucified: mercifully grant that we, walking in the way of the cross, may find it none other than the way of life and peace; through Jesus Christ your Son our Lord, who is alive and reigns with you, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever. Amen

First Bible Reading Isaiah Chapter 55:1-9

"Come, all you who are thirsty, come to the waters; and you who have no money, come, buy and eat! Come, buy wine and milk without money and without cost. Why spend money on what is not bread, and your labour on what does not satisfy? Listen, listen to me, and eat what is good, and your soul will delight in the richest of fare. Give ear and come to me; hear me, that your soul may live. I will make an everlasting covenant with you, my faithful love promised to David. See, I have made him a witness to the peoples, a leader and commander of the peoples. Surely you will summon nations you know not, and nations that do not know you will hasten to you, because of the LORD your God, the Holy One of Israel, for he has endowed you with splendour." Seek the LORD while he may be found; call on him while he is near. Let the wicked forsake his way and the evil man his thoughts. Let him turn to the LORD, and he will have mercy on him, and to our God, for he will freely pardon. "For my thoughts are not your thoughts, neither are your ways my ways," declares the LORD. "As the heavens are higher than the earth, so are my ways higher than your ways and my thoughts than your thoughts. (This is the word of the Lord -- **Thanks be to God**)

Second Reading I Corinthians Chapter 10:1-13

For I do not want you to be ignorant of the fact, brothers, that our forefathers were all under the cloud and that they all passed through the sea. They were all baptized into Moses in the cloud and in the sea. They all ate the same spiritual food and drank the same spiritual drink; for they drank from the spiritual rock that accompanied them, and that rock was Christ. Nevertheless, God was not pleased with most of them; their bodies were scattered over the desert. Now these things occurred as examples to keep us from setting our hearts on evil things as they did. Do not be idolaters, as some of them were; as it is written: "The people sat down to eat and drink and got up to indulge in pagan revelry." We should not commit sexual immorality, as some of them did--and in one day twenty-three thousand of them died. We should not test the Lord, as some of them did--and were killed by snakes. And do not grumble, as some of them did--and were killed by the destroying angel. These things happened to them as examples and were written down as warnings for us, on whom the fulfilment of the ages has come. So, if you think you are standing firm, be careful that you don't fall! No temptation has seized you except what is common to man. And God is faithful; he will not let you be tempted beyond what you can bear. But when you are tempted, he will also provide a way out so that you can stand up under it. (This is the word of the Lord -- **Thanks be to God**)

Gospel Reading Luke Chapter 13:1-9

Now there were some present at that time who told Jesus about the Galileans whose blood Pilate had mixed with their sacrifices. Jesus answered, "Do you think that these Galileans were worse sinners than all the other Galileans because they suffered this way? I tell you, no! But unless you

repent, you too will all perish. Or those eighteen who died when the tower in Siloam fell on them--do you think they were more guilty than all the others living in Jerusalem? I tell you, no! But unless you repent, you too will all perish." Then he told this parable: "A man had a fig tree, planted in his vineyard, and he went to look for fruit on it, but did not find any. So he said to the man who took care of the vineyard, 'For three years now I've been coming to look for fruit on this fig tree and haven't found any. Cut it down! Why should it use up the soil?' "'Sir,' the man replied, 'leave it alone for one more year, and I'll dig around it and fertilize it. If it bears fruit next year, fine! If not, then cut it down.'" (This is the word of the Lord -- **Thanks be to God**)

Commentary

You can just imagine the relish with which some people told Jesus the horrible story about the Galileans who were slaughtered by Pilate. Bad news travels very fast, and I expect they got a ghoulish pleasure from retelling the shocking details, while wringing their hands over the ritual defilement of the Temple. The story tellers were probably expecting Jesus to shake His head and say that it served the Galileans right, that God was punishing them for some transgression of the Law. But Jesus wouldn't play along. He refused to give a trite explanation of why these poor men had died such particularly gruesome and shocking deaths. (Humans always long to be able to account for a disaster by blaming the person to whom it happens!). Jesus wouldn't score such an easy point, but instead argued that the real lesson from to be drawn from their deaths is that it is essential to repent before a similar fate befalls His hearers. As always Jesus surprised, disappointed and even shocked His hearers. Instead of gaining a comfortable, complacent feeling that they were safe, that they were saved, Jesus reminded them that they too were vulnerable to the dangers of the world and that the only safety to be gained was through repentance and being "right" with God. Jesus' insistence that all of us are sinners isn't always easy to listen to: perhaps we feel that we are doing our best. Repentance is a two speed process: the once-for-all event which marks a change in hearts and a determination to live in the Way of Christ, and a slower, daily determination to correct our course, until it lies with His. The need for repentance has never been more important, is Jesus' message for them and for us. *Joan Crossley*

News from the Wider Church

Women's Ordination. The first women who were ordained priest in the Church of England celebrated their tenth anniversary in Bristol Cathedral this week. The latest figures show 1262 full-time stipendiary women priests in dioceses, 715 non-stipendiary ministers (NSM), 208 ordained local ministers (OLM), and 212 chaplains. Yet, although women priests make up a fifth of the total number of clergy in the Church of England, comparatively few are yet in senior appointments. The Bristol celebrations come amid fierce debate about women bishops and fresh calls for the rescinding of the Act of Synod, which allowed Provincial Episcopal Visitors ("flying bishops") to oversee parishes that could not in conscience accept women priests.

Our own Partnership Churches have unanimously supported a motion in support of the move to rescind. The Group for Rescinding the Act of Synod (GRAS) has declared the Act to be an undermining of women's ministry, and described it in a recent campaign advertisement as "legitimising discrimination against women that would be unlawful and subject to criminal prosecution in other institutions and workplaces". Forward in Faith (FiF) has intensified its stance that the Act is the only device that enables the Church of England to hold together. The organisation says that having women bishops would make the Act unworkable, and has reiterated its determination to establish a "free province", if women were appointed to the episcopate.

We've had the 10 commandments for more than 3000 years - a new phone text competition for under-40s asks: isn't it about time for an 11th? The Methodist Church this week overturns the traditional impression that it wants nothing to do with pubs as it takes to bars across Britain to promote a phone text competition for under-40s. In a campaign to discover what under-40s think are the pressing spiritual issues of the day, 250,000 drinks mats featuring six designs are being distributed by specialist marketers Thirsty's to 250 city and town bars frequented by students and under-40s.

There are six separate drinks mat designs, which include suggestions for a possible new 11th commandment: 'Stop war'; 'Reduce emissions'; 'Eat more donuts'; 'Remove all packaging'; 'Never give out your password'; 'Do not disturb'

Competition organisers, the Methodist Church together with website shipoffools.com hope that under-40s might spend a few minutes thinking and maybe discussing what they would like to be the 11th commandment. More than 500 people have already sent in their entries. The competition is being seen as the beginning of a dialogue between the Church and adults in their 20s and 30s. Like other churches, Methodism has recognized lower numbers of this age group attending traditional church services. This is the first of a series of initiatives designed to help Methodist leaders to understand better the culture of under-40s and what they think about God. The drinks mats and postcards were designed by the Methodist Church Communication Office. The postcards were distributed nationally to 260 multiplex cinemas, 850 café bars and almost 370 universities and colleges. To enter the competition, participants need to text ELEVEN plus the suggested 11th Commandment to 84880 (for example send 'ELEVEN Thou shalt not text and drive'). The best five commandments received by the closing date of 31 March 2004 will win a camera phone. Later in the year the organisers hope to publish a book with the best competition entries. This will allow the Church to share what people say with a wider audience. Why not have a go!
