First Bible Reading - Daniel Chapter 12:1-3

Second Reading— Hebrews 10: 11-25

Day after day every priest stands and performs his religious duties; again and again he offers the same sacrifices, which can never take away sins. But when this priest had offered for all time one sacrifice for sins, he sat down at the right hand of God. Since that time he waits for his enemies to be made his footstool, because by one sacrifice he has made perfect forever those who are being made holy. The Holy Spirit also testifies to us about this. First he says: This is the covenant I will make with them after that time, says the Lord. I will put my laws in their hearts, and I will write them on their minds. Then he adds: Their sins and lawless acts I will remember no more. And where these have been forgiven, there is no longer any sacrifice for sin. Let us hold unswervingly to the hope we profess, for he who promised is faithful. And let us consider how we may spur one another on toward love and good deeds. Let us not give up meeting together, as some are in the habit of doing, but let us encourage one another--and all the more as you see the Day approaching.

Gospel Reading—Mark 13: 1-8

As he was leaving the temple, one of his disciples said to him, "Look, Teacher! What massive stones! What magnificent buildings!" "Do you see all these great buildings?" replied Jesus. "Not one stone here will be left on another; every one will be thrown down." As Jesus was sitting on the Mount of Olives opposite the temple, Peter, James, John and Andrew asked him privately, "Tell us, when will these things happen? And what will be the sign that they are all about to be

fulfilled?" Jesus said to them: "Watch out that no one deceives you. Many will come in my name, claiming, 'I am he,' and will deceive many. When you hear of wars and rumours of wars, do not be alarmed. Such things must happen, but the end is still to come. Nation will rise against nation, and kingdom against kingdom. There will be earthquakes in various places, and famines. These are the beginning of birth pains.

(Reader: This is the word of the Lord - **All: Thanks be to God**)

Meditation

Let us’ This inviting phrase is used five times in verses 19 to 25 of Hebrews Chapter 10: Let us draw near to God; Let us hold unswervingly to the hope we profess, for he who promised is faithful; Let us consider how we may spur one another on towards love and good deeds; Let us not give up meeting together; Let us encourage one another’.

As we ponder on these phrases let them flow through us; let them warm our hearts; let them challenge us; let them strengthen us; let them move us forward as fellow pilgrims on our journey of faith. *Wendy Waters*

Post Communion Prayer

Gracious Lord, in this holy sacrament you give substance to our hope: bring us at the last to that fullness of life for which we long; through Jesus Christ our Saviour.

Commentary

Both the reading from Daniel and Mark challenge us to consider our understanding of ‘the end times’. Emphasis on the ‘end times’ and the fear associated with it has often been a tactic of some Christians, probably since Christianity began. We have only to look at some of the great masterpieces of religious art to experience this, with images of hell fire and damnation alongside those of Christ's birth, life and death. But this has never been my understanding of what God has to offer us and as we look closer at the passages set for today we can see that they do in fact present us with a bigger picture.

The book of Daniel has been likened to a ‘spiral staircase’ which moves round the same point time and again and brings us to a higher vantage point from which we can gain clear and fuller view of things’. Well here in Chapter 12 we are almost at the top of the spiral stairs in the final chapter of the book. The Book of Daniel is generally agreed to have been written at a time when the Jews were in a distressed state, although there are two schools of thought when it was written. Either 600 years before Christ, when the Hebrews were in exile, or about 160 years before Christ when the Hebrews were fighting for the survival of their faith. So bearing this in mind we can see that the Daniel Chapter 12 verses 1 - 3, are words not to make the Hebrews fearful but words of encouragement within verse 1 the reassurance that ‘all those who believed would be delivered from the distress, many who have died will be given everlasting life’, and ‘those who are wise will shine like brightness of the heavens’.

A year or two ago there was a trend in some Christian training to use the abbreviations:

WWJT, WWJS and WWJD: standing for ‘What would Jesus Think; What Would Jesus Say; What Would Jesus Do?’

This morning's Mark passage is perhaps the place to look for ‘What would Jesus say about the ‘end time’. Jesus is with four of his closest friends Peter, James, John and Andrew. One of them has just admired the magnificence of Herod's, still incomplete, temple. Having, seen some of the huge foundation stones under the wall around where the temple stood, I am not surprised at his comments. But Jesus did not share his friend's wonder, and predicted the time when the temple would be destroyed. It seems that, whilst perhaps puzzling over Jesus' strange response, the friends continued their walk down out of the temple and up the hill opposite to the Mount of Olives, before Andrew ‘asked him privately’ ‘when these things would happen?’ Interesting that he asked Jesus ‘privately’. Was Andrew embarrassed not to have understood Jesus? Then Jesus answers his friend with warnings about being on guard against deception by those who falsely claim to be him. But he tells them not to be alarmed when they ‘hear about wars and rumours of wars’ Jesus says these things ‘must happen’ but is not the ‘end’. Jesus

explains further that there will be natural disasters but again he does not say this is the 'end', like many would have us believe. No he equates this to birth-pains. Perhaps this seems an odd analogy when speaking to four men, but they would have been very aware of what women in labour went through, there was little privacy in family life in those days as their homes were very close together. Many men today choose to be with the mother's of their children as they give birth, they want to share in the pain the excitement and the joy. They know that birth pains do not last for ever and are not something to be feared and, in most cases, are not the sign of something coming to an end, but the promise and start of something new, new life, and in this case new life in Jesus.

So if this is what Jesus says about the future let us not be fearful, let us not be anxious, but do as the writer urged the Hebrews to in Chapter 10 verse 23: 'Hold unswervingly to the hope we profess, for he who promised is faithful'. *Wendy Waters*

The challenge of Prisons Week 2009 is to "hold fast to hope" – a hope that is not just a fanciful optimism but one that is rooted in the Christian hope that the divine spark is in all people, that no-one is beyond redemption and that change does and can take place.

The theme for Prisons Week this year is Hold Fast to Hope, encouraging Christians to focus on real stories of hope and redemption from around the world. Revd David Gamble, President of the Methodist Conference, said; "Prisons week reminds us of the harsh realities of crime and imprisonment, but it also speaks of hope in dark places. This is a time to pray for those in prison and those affected by crime as we seek a better future for all. It's also a time to give thanks for and remember the contribution made by chaplains to the lives of those living and working in prisons." The Prisons Week website (www.prisonsw.org) offers a range of free resources, including prayers, sketches and stories of hope from the UK and further afield. Revd Alan Ogier, Superintendent Methodist and Free Church Chaplain to the Prison Service, said; "The Christian message is one of real hope for all – not just shallow optimism. This is a solid belief that no one is beyond redemption, that change can and does happen."

Lord, you offer freedom to all people. We pray for those in prison. Break the bonds of fear and isolation that exist. Support with your love prisoners and their families and friends, prison staff and all who care. Heal those who have been wounded by the activities of others, especially the victims of crime. 17 December Christmas According to Matthew



Traditionally the symbols attributed to the Gospel writers are Matthew a winged man, Mark a lion, Luke an Ox and John an Eagle. The image attributed to Matthew is a divine man. His Gospel is concerned to show the genealogy of Jesus from Abraham to

the King David (14 generations) and from David to the deportation into Babylon (14 generations) and from the exile in Babylon to the Messiah a further 14 generations. Matthew is seen as the Gospel of Christ's humanity and His humbleness and humility is highlighted throughout the book.

The image attributed to Luke is that of a winged ox. A calf or indeed oxen were used in sacrifices in the Temple.

The opening of Luke's Gospel begins with the announcement of the birth of John the Baptist to his father Zechariah a priest in the Temple who was offering sacrifice there. The winged ox is seen as a reminder of the priestly character of Jesus and of his sacrificial death for the sins of all mankind.

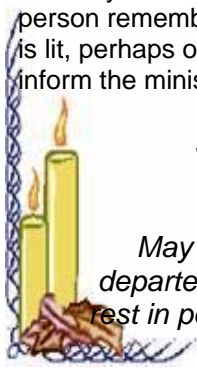

Sceptics argue that the speed of change in history is slow and the changes required are unlikely to be made before 2050. But hope replies, "Consider the many unforeseen changes that have successfully occurred in our lifetimes." Concerned people throughout the country, of all political parties and faiths, are beginning to rally to the challenge. It is hoped that this public meeting will gather a wide range of interest groups together.
