First Bible Reading -Genesis 12: 1-4a

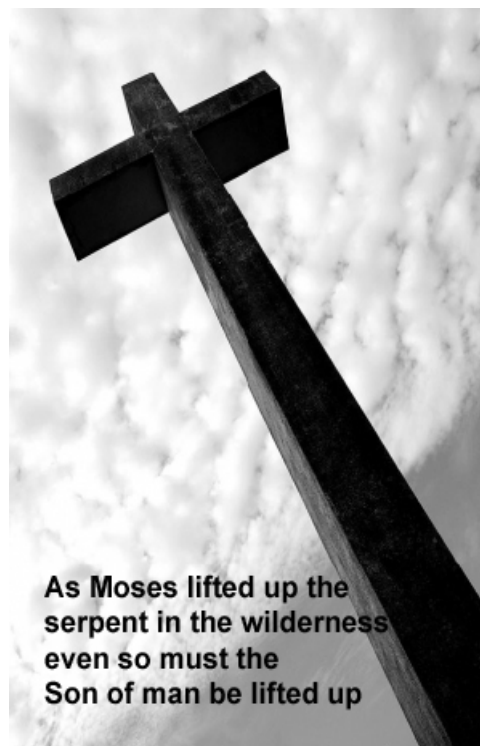
The LORD had said to Abram, "Leave your country, your people and your father's household and go to the land I will show you. "I will make you into a great nation and I will bless you; I will make your name great, and you will be a blessing. I will bless those who bless you, and whoever curses you I will curse; and all peoples on earth will be blessed through you." So Abram left, as the LORD had told him; and Lot went with him. (This is the word of the Lord - **All: Thanks be to God**)

Second Bible Reading - Romans 4: 1-5, 13-17

What then shall we say that Abraham, our forefather, discovered in this matter? If, in fact, Abraham was justified by works, he had something to boast about—but not before God. What does the Scripture say? "Abraham believed God, and it was credited to him as righteousness." Now when a man works, his wages are not credited to him as a gift, but as an obligation. However, to the man who does not work but trusts God who justifies the wicked, his faith is credited as righteousness. It was not through law that Abraham and his offspring received the promise that he would be heir of the world, but through the righteousness that comes by faith. For if those who live by law are heirs, faith has no value and the promise is worthless, because law brings wrath. And where there is no law there is no transgression.

Therefore, the promise comes by faith, so that it may be by grace and may be guaranteed to all Abraham's offspring—not only to those who are of the law but also to those who are of the faith of Abraham. He is the father of us all. As it is written: "I have made you a father of many nations." He is our father in the sight of God, in whom he believed—the God who gives life to the dead and calls things that are not as though they were. (This is the word of the Lord - **All: Thanks be to God**)

Third Reading - John 3: 1-17 *Please stand* When announced 'Glory to Christ our Saviour' Now there was a man of the Pharisees named Nicodemus, a member of the Jewish ruling council. He came to Jesus at night and said, "Rabbi, we know you are a teacher who has come from God. For no one could perform the miraculous signs you are doing if God were not with him." In reply Jesus declared, "I tell you the truth, no one can see the kingdom of God unless he is born again" "How can a man be born when he is old?" Nicodemus asked. "Surely he cannot enter a second time into his mother's womb to be born!" Jesus answered, "I tell you the truth, no one can enter the kingdom of God unless he is born of water and the Spirit. Flesh gives birth to flesh, but the Spirit gives birth to spirit. You should not be surprised at my saying, 'You must be born again.' The wind blows wherever it pleases. You hear its sound, but you cannot tell where it comes from or where it is going. So it is with everyone born of the Spirit." "How can this be?" Nicodemus asked. "You are Israel's teacher," said Jesus, "and do you not understand these things? I tell you the truth, we speak of what we know, and we testify to what we have seen, but still you people do not accept our testimony. I have spoken to you of earthly things and you do not believe; how then will you believe if I speak of heavenly things? No one has ever gone into heaven except the one who came from heaven—the Son of Man— Just as Moses lifted up the snake in the desert, so the Son of Man must be



As Moses lifted up the serpent in the wilderness even so must the Son of man be lifted up

lifted up, that everyone who believes in him may have eternal life. "For God so loved the world that he gave his one and only Son, that whoever believes in him shall not perish but have eternal life. For God did not send his Son into the world to condemn the world, but to save the world through him. (Reader: This is the Gospel of Christ — **All: Praise to Christ our Lord**)

Commentary

The Gospel of John was written with a real purpose in mind - to cause the reader to believe

But these are written that you may believe that Jesus is the Christ, the Son of God, and that by believing you may have life in his name. (John 20:31)

Perhaps one of the major discourses in the Gospel which serves to bring this about, is found in this dialogue between Jesus and Nicodemus. We are in Lent, that time of the year when we are all engaged in seeking to live our lives in closer obedience. Lent is a time when some forgo the after dinner mints or the pre dinner sherry, our equivalent of sackcloth and ashes. It is a time of repentance and mourning over what we might be, if only we could try harder. Yet we are reminded in this verse that the way of the cross is not about what we have done or left undone, but about what God has done. God loves the world, loves it so much that he gave of his life. Jesus comes not to scold but to save. It was out of love that he came among us and stood beside us and died with us, for us, and saved us. It is all about love and because of God's love we are not here as the lost but as the found.

For God so loved the world that he gave his only Son For God sent the Son into the world, not to condemn the world, but that the world might be saved through him (John 3:16-17)

Nicodemus was a religious leader, he had much understanding, yet he is told that he must start over. He must start looking at things differently. It is also a real success story. So often Jesus seems to fail in his teachings. People ignore Jesus, take oppositions against Jesus, even his closest disciples go on to deny that they know him. Yet we are told that Nicodemus was a man of considerable courage. In John 7:50-52, Nicodemus appeals to the Law of Moses to defend Jesus to his fellows in the Sanhedrin. In John 19:38-40, it is Nicodemus who aligns himself publicly with Jesus in his "lifting up" by joining Joseph of Arimathea in removing Jesus' body from the cross and burying him with an enormous outlay of spices. Nicodemus clearly changed. Not in the sense of factual knowledge, but in terms of his relationship to Jesus. What Jesus says about the difference between water and spirit makes the point that we can be physically alive, but there is another level of life - spiritual life. We know this to be true and Nicodemus found it. As we look around at our society today, perhaps now as importantly as ever before, we need to know the truth of these words. For so many people, in spite of the presence of so many things, life is still very empty. Real fulfilment is found through faith in the love of God, found in Jesus. *Charles Royden*

What did the Archbishop say ?

Whenever I have been involved in an issue reported by the press, I have to say that usually there are many factual inaccuracies. Sometimes this is a mistake, sometimes there is a clear and deliberate spin which distorts and gives the wrong impression. There are occasions when our press will refuse to print things which it wants kept quiet. This is all very worrying, but it is even more worrying when as Christians our faith is under attack by vested interests. We live in a society where some who control our press are quick to discredit the church and where many secular interests like nothing better than to criticise religious belief. Just because it appears in a newspaper doesn't mean it is true, in fact it most probably isn't! Our Archbishop has recently suffered a sustained attack and it is quite remarkable that people have jumped so quickly to condemn him without having first read the facts of what he said, as opposed to what the media think he said. Journalists without any comprehension of theology have assumed powers of understanding well above their abilities. A visit to our church website will provide you with access to the full transcripts and comments from our own Bishop of St Albans.

The following information comes from the website of the Archbishop.

The Archbishop made no proposals for sharia in either the lecture or the interview, and certainly did not call for its introduction as some kind of parallel jurisdiction to the civil law. Instead, in the interview, rather than proposing a parallel system of law, he observed that "as a matter of fact certain provisions of sharia are already recognised in our society and under our law". When the question was put to him that: "the application of sharia in certain circumstances - if we want to achieve this cohesion and take seriously peoples' religion - seems unavoidable?", he indicated his assent.

The Archbishop opened his lecture by noting importantly that the very term sharia is not only misunderstood, but is the focus of much fear and anxiety deriving from its 'primitivist' application in some contexts. As such he said that sharia is a method of law rather than a single complete and final system ready to be applied wholesale to every situation, and noted that there was room, even within Islamic states which apply sharia, for some level of 'dual identity', where the state is not in fact religiously homogenous.

In his lecture, the Archbishop sought carefully to explore the limits of a unitary and secular legal system in the presence of an increasingly plural (including religiously plural) society and to see how such a unitary system might be able to accommodate religious claims. Behind this is the underlying principle that Christians cannot claim exceptions from a secular unitary system on religious grounds (for instance in situations where Christian doctors might not be compelled to perform abortions), if they are not willing to consider how a unitary system can accommodate other religious consciences. In doing so the Archbishop was not suggesting the introduction of parallel legal jurisdictions, but exploring ways in which reasonable accommodation might be made within existing arrangements for religious conscience.

He explained that his core aim was to: "to tease out some of the broader issues around the rights of religious groups within a secular state" and was using sharia as an example. These include:

- How when the law does not take seriously religious motivation, it fails to engage with the community in question and opens up real issues of power by the majority over the minority, with potentially harmful effects for community cohesion.
- How the distinction between cultural practices and those arising from genuine religious belief might be managed.
- How to deal with the possibility that a 'supplementary jurisdiction' could have the effect of reinforcing in minority communities some of the most repressive or retrograde elements in them, with particularly serious consequences for the role and liberties of women".

At the end of the lecture the Archbishop referred to a suggestion by a Jewish jurist that there might be room for 'overlapping jurisdictions' in which "individuals might choose in certain limited areas whether to seek justice under one system or another". This is what currently happens both within the Jewish arrangements and increasingly in current alternative dispute resolution and mediation practice.

He concludes his lecture with the comment:

"if we are to think intelligently about the relations between Islam and British law, we need a fair amount of 'deconstruction' of crude oppositions and mythologies, whether of the nature of sharia or the nature of the Enlightenment"
