First Bible Reading—1 Kings 21: 1-10, 15-21a

Some time later there was an incident involving a vineyard belonging to Naboth the Jezreelite. The vineyard was in Jezreel, close to the palace of Ahab king of Samaria. Ahab said to Naboth, "Let me have your vineyard to use for a vegetable garden, since it is close to my palace. In exchange I will give you a better vineyard or, if you prefer, I will pay you whatever it is worth." But Naboth replied, "The LORD forbid that I should give you the inheritance of my fathers." So Ahab went home, sullen and angry because Naboth the Jezreelite had said, "I will not give you the inheritance of my fathers." He lay on his bed sulking and refused to eat. His wife Jezebel came in and asked him, "Why are you so sullen? Why won't you eat?" He answered her, "Because I said to Naboth the Jezreelite, 'Sell me your vineyard; or if you prefer, I will give you another vineyard in its place.' But he said, 'I will not give you my vineyard.'" Jezebel his wife said, "Is this how you act as king over Israel? Get up and eat! Cheer up. I'll get you the vineyard of Naboth the Jezreelite." So she wrote letters in Ahab's name, placed his seal on them, and sent them to the elders and nobles who lived in Naboth's city with him. In those letters she wrote: "Proclaim a day of fasting and seat Naboth in a prominent place among the people. But seat two scoundrels opposite him and have them testify that he has cursed both God and the king. Then take him out and stone him to death." As soon as Jezebel heard that Naboth had been stoned to death, she said to Ahab, "Get up and take possession of the vineyard of Naboth the Jezreelite that he refused to sell you. He is no longer alive, but dead." When Ahab heard that Naboth was dead, he got up and went down to take possession of Naboth's vineyard. Then the word of the LORD came to Elijah the Tishbite: "Go down to meet Ahab king of Israel, who rules in Samaria. He is now in Naboth's vineyard, where he has gone to take possession of it. Say to him, 'This is what the LORD says: Have you not murdered a man and seized his property?' Then say to him, 'This is what the LORD says: In the place where dogs licked up Naboth's blood, dogs will lick up your blood—yes, yours!'" Ahab said to Elijah, "So you have found me, my enemy!" "I have found you," he answered, "because you have sold yourself to do evil in the eyes of the LORD. I am going to bring disaster on you. (This is the word of the Lord - **Thanks be to God**)

Second Bible Reading — Galatians 2: 15-21

We who are Jews by birth and not 'Gentile sinners' know that a man is not justified by observing the law, but by faith in Jesus Christ. So we, too, have put our faith in Christ Jesus that we may be justified by faith in Christ and not by observing the law, because by observing the law no one will be justified. If, while we seek to be justified in Christ, it becomes evident that we ourselves are sinners, does that mean that Christ promotes sin? Absolutely not! If I rebuild what I destroyed, I prove that I am a lawbreaker. For through the law I died to the law so that I might live for God. I have been crucified with Christ and I no longer live, but Christ lives in me. The life I live in the body, I live by faith in the Son of God, who loved me and gave himself for me. I do not set aside the grace of God, for if righteousness could be gained through the law, Christ died for nothing!"
(This is the word of the Lord - **Thanks be to God**)

Third Bible Reading – Luke 7: 36-8:3

(After the Gospel is announced—**Glory to Christ our Saviour**)

Now one of the Pharisees invited Jesus to have dinner with him, so he went to the Pharisee's house and reclined at the table. When a woman who had lived a sinful life in that town learned that Jesus was eating at the Pharisee's house, she brought an alabaster jar of perfume, and as she stood behind him at his feet weeping, she began to wet his feet with her tears. Then she wiped them with her hair, kissed them and poured perfume on them. When the Pharisee who had invited him saw this, he said to himself, "If this man were a prophet, he would know who is touching him and what kind of woman she is--that she is a sinner." Jesus answered him, "Simon, I have something to tell you." "Tell me, teacher," he said. "Two men owed money to a certain moneylender. One owed him five hundred denarii, and the other fifty. Neither of them had the money to pay him back, so he cancelled the debts of both. Now which of them will love him more?" Simon replied, "I suppose the one who had the bigger debt cancelled." "You have judged correctly," Jesus said. Then he turned toward the woman and said to Simon, "Do you see this woman? I came into your house. You did not give me any water for my feet, but she wet my feet with her tears and wiped them with her hair. You did not give me a kiss, but this woman, from the time I entered, has not stopped kissing my feet. You did not put oil on my head, but she has poured perfume on my feet. Therefore, I tell you, her many sins have been forgiven--for she loved much. But he who has been forgiven little loves little." Then Jesus said to her, "Your sins are forgiven." The other guests began to say among themselves, "Who is this who even forgives sins?" Jesus said to the woman, "Your faith has saved you; go in peace." After this, Jesus travelled about from one town and village to another, proclaiming the good news of the kingdom of God. The Twelve were with him, and also some women who had been cured of evil spirits and diseases: Mary (called Magdalene) from whom seven demons had come out; Joanna the wife of Cuza, the manager of Herod's household; Susanna; and many others. These women were helping to support them out of their own means

(This is the Gospel of Christ - **Praise to Christ our Lord**)

Commentary

We tend to think of Pharisees in the Gospel stories as 'baddies.' It is true that they were frequently some of the most fierce opponents of Jesus, however in Luke 13:31, it was Pharisees who warned Jesus that Herod was planning to kill him. Then in John 3, it was Nicodemus, a Pharisee, who comes to Jesus by night saying, "Rabbi, we know that you are a teacher who has come from God; for no one can do these signs that you do apart from the presence of God." It is perhaps not surprising therefore to find Jesus in the home of a Pharisee, having been invited for dinner. The dinner would be a more public affair than in our homes today, perhaps in a house with a courtyard area, where people could wander in and observe those eating. Simon might have been interested in Jesus, this young prophet Jesus, with a growing reputation. He might have wanted to see what Jesus had to say, even if he did not agree with him.

At the dinner Jesus and his friends are reclining around the room, perhaps on cushions. It is as Jesus is lying down that a woman approaches him and starts to wash his feet. But, she doesn't stop there, she goes on to perform a particularly sensuous and provocative act of kissing the feet of Jesus and wiping them with her hair. Custom prohibited women from letting down their hair in the presence of any man except their husband, and husbands are permitted to divorce wives who violate that rule. We can only chuckle to think how all of the highly religious people around the room would have responded to this. But it gets worse. Not only was the woman carrying out these actions, she was also known by the men there to be lacking in the area of her own reputation. We do not know if she was a prostitute, but clearly she was no angel. Who knows how the men came by this knowledge of the moral condition of the woman!

Lets us look at all of the characters in the story

The woman is a sinner, she knows it, the Pharisees know it and so did the disciples of Jesus. However the woman obviously believes in her heart that sin does not prevent her from loving and being loved by Jesus. She sees in Jesus somebody who can look beyond the appearance of sin and offer to her acceptance and forgiveness. The woman would know exactly what the men would say about her, if she was a prostitute she would also have a good understanding of the hypocrisy of men who judged her. She was not prepared to allow the criticism of others, human boundaries or rituals, to restrain her emotional outpouring.

Simon, the Pharisee, was just doing what he had always been told to do. He wants to do the right thing, and this woman was behaving inappropriately. Sadly for Simon, Jesus doesn't have much time for people

who judge others and who think well of themselves. His self-righteousness resulted in an ambivalence towards Jesus, demonstrated in his failure to give to Jesus sufficient courtesy, so much so that Jesus felt able to refer to it publicly. Jesus shows that it was not the woman but Simon who had fallen short. The woman had felt forgiveness and responded in love, Simon had clearly not come to terms with his own needs of forgiveness.

Jesus is quite relaxed about the incident itself, for him social conventions can be easily dispensed with in the light of God's kingdom. He recognises that the touch of the sinner does not make him unclean, rather contact with him offers to all people fresh hope. Jesus refuses to push the woman away, he is concerned not for his own reputation but rather to acknowledge the love shown towards him.

Ourselves It is a marvellous story and it tells us lots about Jesus and his opponents. It also challenges us to ask ourselves, 'how would I have behaved?' Would we be like the Pharisees or Jesus? Or to ask the question in a more pertinent way, 'how do we behave today?' We could be judgemental and self-righteous like Simon, or we could be overwhelmed by the forgiveness shown by Jesus—like the woman. The story reminds us that we are all sinners, all reliant upon the goodness of God to overcome the failure of ourselves. Sadly we so often forget this and become judgemental towards others, thinking that there are levels and degrees of sin. None of us must imagine ourselves to be immune from this kind of spiritual pride. *Charles Royden*

Meditation

A father was watching his young son trying to dislodge a heavy stone. The boy couldn't budge it. "Are you sure you are using all your strength?" the father asked. "Yes, I am," said the exasperated boy. "No, you are not," the father replied. "You haven't asked me to help you."
