First Bible Reading - Exodus 2:1-10

Now a man of the house of Levi married a Levite woman, and she became pregnant and gave birth to a son. When she saw that he was a fine child, she hid him for three months. But when she could hide him no longer, she got a papyrus basket for him and coated it with tar and pitch. Then she placed the child in it and put it among the reeds along the bank of the Nile. His sister stood at a distance to see what would happen to him. Then Pharaoh's daughter went down to the Nile to bathe, and her attendants were walking along the river bank. She saw the basket among the reeds and sent her slave girl to get it. She opened it and saw the baby. He was crying, and she felt sorry for him. "This is one of the Hebrew babies," she said. Then his sister asked Pharaoh's daughter, "Shall I go and get one of the Hebrew women to nurse the baby for you?" "Yes, go," she answered. And the girl went and got the baby's mother. Pharaoh's daughter said to her, "Take this baby and nurse him for me, and I will pay you." So the woman took the baby and nursed him. When the child grew older, she took him to Pharaoh's daughter and he became her son. She named him Moses, saying, "I drew him out of the water." (This is the word of the Lord -- **Thanks be to God**)



Second Reading - 2 Corinthians Chapter 1:3-7

Praise be to the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, the Father of compassion and the God of all comfort, who comforts us in all our troubles, so that we can comfort those in any trouble with the comfort we ourselves have received from God. For just as the sufferings of Christ flow over into our lives, so also through Christ our comfort overflows. If we are distressed, it is for your comfort and salvation; if we are comforted, it is for your comfort, which produces in you patient endurance of the same sufferings we suffer. And our hope for you is firm, because we know that just as you share in our sufferings, so also you share in our comfort. (This is the word of the Lord -- **Thanks be to God**)

Gospel reading - Luke 2: 33-35

The child's father and mother marvelled at what was said about him. Then Simeon blessed them and said to Mary, his mother: "This child is destined to cause the falling and rising of many in Israel, and to be a sign that will be spoken against, so that the thoughts of many hearts will be revealed. And a sword will pierce your own soul too." (This is the word of the Lord -- **Thanks be to God**)

Commentary

In the fourteenth century Julian of Norwich, the first woman to write in modern English, experienced and understood the motherhood of God in her visions. Mothering Sunday is a good day to share her vision and recognise that although we are distinguished by our gender, God is not. Instead God is both mother and father to us .

'As truly as God is Father, so just as truly is he our mother.' Julian of Norwich.

Motherhood was not easy for Mary. She was young, inexperienced and unmarried. Her pregnancy was viewed with suspicion. Her baby was born far from home in difficult and dangerous surroundings.

When she took her son to the temple, only days old, Simeon's prophecy for his future was both ominous and exciting. Jesus' childhood gave her cause for concern and in adulthood, it was clear that his life would become increasingly dangerous and he would be marginalised. Mary had to learn to put her own feelings to one side to support him in his mission. Finally, she suffered the worst thing that can happen to a mother, she had to watch her son die a tortured death.

Meditation Mothering Sunday

The fourth Sunday in Lent is called Mothering Sunday. There are traditions associated with Mothering Sunday in England which date back as long ago as the 16th century. It is told that this was the day when people were encouraged to return to worship in their 'mother church where they had been baptised. People who usually attended the local parish church, would make a longer journey to the 'mother church' or cathedral of the Diocese. Girls in domestic service would bake to show their mothers their new skills in the form of a gift, traditionally a simnel cake. On this day many girls who were in service were allowed time off from domestic chores to visit their mothers and their family.

Today Mothering Sunday is a popular day when Christians choose to use the occasion to think about all things which concern motherhood. We give thanks for the Church as Mother, the Virgin Mary as the mother of Jesus, we remember that God cares for us like a mother and last but not least we give thanks for our own mothers. Mothering Sunday is the fourth Sunday in Lent and it is a time of special for thanksgiving. Sunday is the one day of joy in Lent, when flowers abound in all churches and when people are allowed a time off from the penitential season. It is also known as Mid-Lent Sunday, Refreshment Sunday or Laetare Sunday. The Latin name of Laetare, means rejoice.

Don't forget mothers this Sunday

This Mother's Day, the Methodist Relief and Development Fund (MRDF) is highlighting the fact that today over one thousand women worldwide will die in childbirth. The vast majority of these deaths take place in the developing world, where mothers can be up to 100 times more likely than their UK counterparts not to survive giving birth.

"This mother's day we hope that people will remember the families that have needlessly lost a mother today - and the loss of potential that these deaths represent. While we can be glad that in the UK, maternal mortality is increasingly rare, it is a scandal that so many women worldwide are still dying simply because they are poor." said MRDF Director Kirsty Smith.

Lack of affordable and accessible health care is one reason for high maternal mortality rates. In Mali, where approximately 500 women die for every 100,000 live births, MRDF partner organisations aim to tackle this problem in the communities where they work. Local volunteers are trained to safely deliver babies and to provide pre- and post-natal care for women in remote and rural communities. Djouraba Koné, who gave birth to her son Yacou under the care of a trained birth attendant, is just one of the mothers who have benefited from the simple, low-cost techniques which help to improve the chances of survival for both mother and child.

Action is taking place on a global scale as well. In 2000, world leaders agreed the Millennium Development Goals, a set of targets to reduce poverty that included the commitment to reduce maternal mortality rates by three quarters by 2015.

It is now half way to 2015, yet little has changed for mothers in countries like Mali. "To make a lasting difference, we need world leaders to stand by their promises," explained Kirsty Smith. "We're urging you to join MRDF supporters and others on 2 June this year to raise your voice against poverty - and ensure that more women like Djouraba live to see their children grow up."

Churches denounce Trident vote

Leaders from the Baptist Union of Great Britain, the Methodist Church and the United Reformed Church have expressed deep concern over Parliament's call to replace the Trident Nuclear Weapons System.

Anthea Cox, Coordinating Secretary for Public Life and Social Justice for the Methodist Church said; "This seriously undermines the UK's commitment to nuclear non-proliferation and the extent of the backbench rebellion demonstrates that many feel passionately that the Government has got this decision wrong. The Government promised a full public debate but instead this early vote in the House of Commons has rushed the discussion while crucial questions remain unanswered."

Graham Sparkes, Head of Faith and Unity for the Baptist Union said; "The use of nuclear weapons is unthinkable. Rather than invest a vast amount of public money in a system that it can never be right to use, the Government ought to be making clear commitments to peacemaking. Trident can never provide the UK with any real security."

Stuart Dew, Secretary for Church and Society, the United Reformed Church commented: "We are deeply disappointed at the call to renew Trident. The Government has ignored the global demand to rid the world of nuclear weapons, claiming that it is acceptable for some states to hold them while for others it is not. This is a commitment to injustice over peace."

The three Churches made a joint submission to the Defence Committee, arguing that the Government has not fully addressed the security risks associated with a renewal of Trident. They state that it is vital to control the proliferation of weapons technology and they raise concerns over the Government's claim that Trident might provide protection against state-sponsored nuclear terrorism.

Representatives from the Churches were present at the rally in Parliament Square, organised by the Campaign for Nuclear Disarmament.
