# Ordinary 16

## First Bible Reading- Jeremiah Chapter 23:1-6

"Woe to the shepherds who are destroying and scattering the sheep of my pasture!" declares the LORD. Therefore this is what the LORD, the God of Israel, says to the shepherds who tend my people: "Because you have scattered my flock and driven them away and have not bestowed care on them, I will bestow punishment on you for the evil you have done," declares the LORD. "I myself will gather the remnant of my flock out of all the countries where I have driven them and will bring them back to their pasture, where they will be fruitful and increase in number. I will place shepherds over them who will tend them, and they will no longer be afraid or terrified, nor will any be missing," declares the LORD. "The days are coming," declares the LORD, "when I will raise up to David a righteous Branch, a King who will reign wisely and do what is just and right in the land. In his days Judah will be saved and Israel will live in safety. This is the name by which he will be called: The LORD Our Righteousness.

(Reader : This is the word of the Lord. **All: Thanks be to God**)

## Second Reading - Ephesians 2:11-22

Therefore, remember that formerly you who are Gentiles by birth and called "uncircumcised" by those who call themselves "the circumcision" (that done in the body by the hands of men)-- remember that at that time you were separate from Christ, excluded from citizenship in Israel and foreigners to the covenants of the promise, without hope and without God in the world. But now in Christ Jesus you who once were far away have been brought near through the blood of Christ. For he himself is our peace, who has made the two one and has destroyed the barrier, the dividing wall of hostility, by abolishing in his flesh the law with its commandments and regulations. His purpose was to create in himself one new man out of the two, thus making peace, and in this one body to reconcile both of them to God through the cross, by which he put to death their hostility. He came and preached peace to you who were far away and peace to those who were near. For through him we both have access to the Father by one Spirit. Consequently, you are no longer foreigners and aliens, but fellow citizens with God's people and members of God's household, built on the foundation of the apostles and prophets, with Christ Jesus himself as the chief cornerstone. In him the whole building is joined together and rises to become a holy temple in the Lord. And in him you too are being built together to become a dwelling in which God lives by his Spirit.

(Reader: This is the word of the Lord. **All: Thanks be to God**)

**Gospel Reading** – Mark 6:30-34,53-56 When announced ‘**Glory to Christ our saviour**

The apostles gathered round Jesus and reported to him all they had done and taught. Then, because so many people were coming and going that they did not even have a chance to eat, he said to them, "Come with me by yourselves to a quiet place and get some rest." So they went away by themselves in a boat to a solitary place. But many who saw them leaving recognised them and ran on foot from all the towns and got there ahead of them. When Jesus landed and saw a large crowd, he had compassion on them, because they were like sheep without a shepherd. So he began teaching them many things. Later, when Jesus and his disciples had crossed over the lake again, they landed at Gennesaret and anchored there. As soon as they got out of the boat, people recognised Jesus. They ran throughout that whole region and carried the sick on mats to wherever they heard he was. And wherever he went - into villages, towns or countryside - they placed the sick in the market-places. They begged him to let them touch even the edge of his cloak, and all who touched him were healed.

**Commentary**

Let us consider today's gospel readings from Mark's gospel.

Earlier in the chapter we read of Jesus sending His disciples out on mission, now they have returned and tell Jesus the results. The crowd however was so large and making such demands on Jesus that he decided to go across the lake to a quiet place. When the crowds saw Jesus get into the boat they realised what he was going to do, so they moved too. At this point the lake is four miles across the water and ten miles by walking around the top of the lake on foot. On a mild day, with little wind, it would take as long to sail as to walk, so the crowd walked and arrived ahead of Jesus. Most men would have been dismayed at having their privacy denied, but Jesus took pity on the crowd who wanted so much of what He alone could give. He saw them as sheep without a shepherd, and sheep alone cannot find their way.

Many people get lost in life for it can become bewildering. We can stand at some crossroads of life and not know which way to go. In this life we are bound to need sustenance. We need strength to keep going, and the inspiration to lift us out of ourselves. Just as a sheep cannot defend itself from attacks of wild beats, so we need help in defying all the temptations of the world. The Bible says that only with Jesus can we be defended and be able to keep ourselves spotless.

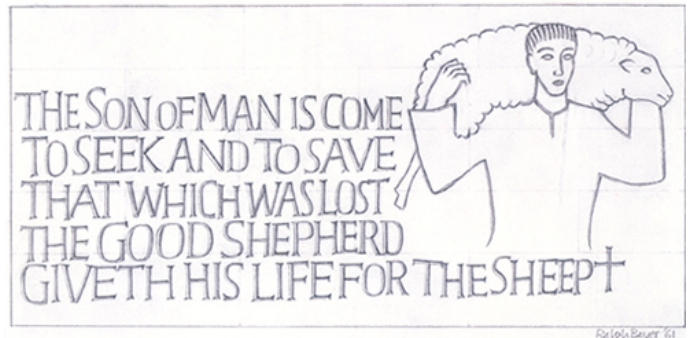
The Bible says the grass was green, which indicates it must have been mid April for that is the time when it is that colour, and it also states that the sun was setting, so placing the time at about 6.00pm.. Jesus realised that the crowd was hungry so he told the disciples that he would feed them. We read this was done from five loaves and two fish.

Jesus then sent the disciples away whilst he retired alone. He went into the mountains to pray, for he faced many problems. He knew the crowd wanted to kidnap him and take him to Jerusalem to make him King, which he had no intention of letting happen, and he didn't want the disciples to be involved. The Jewish authorities were trying to have him killed, and Herod was suspicious of him. At about 3-30am he looked across the lake and saw the disciples were in trouble as a storm had gathered and it was threatening to sink the disciples in their boat. Jesus went to them, and this is where we read of him walking across the water. He remained with them.

We find that as soon as Jesus landed once again, crowds swarmed around him. There are so many people these days who expect to be catered for their every need. There are people you

never hear from unless they want something from you. There are those who will come to Church when the Church can satisfy their needs, but will seldom be seen otherwise. There are similarly those who seek to make use of God. They never think of God unless they need him, their prayers are not intercessory but demands.

In American hotels they have a man or boy called a bell-hop. A Guest rings a bell and the bell-hop appears and fetches on demand. Some see God as someone who is there to be summoned when something is needed. We are all guilty to some extent. How Jesus would be overjoyed if we came more often to offer our service, devotion, and love, and be less demanding. *Eric Royden*



### **Meditation**

If someone asked you, 'What do you think of Jesus Christ?' How would you answer? Would you say, as Christians of an evangelical persuasion would be expected to say, 'he is Lord and Saviour.

Most people have an opinion about Christ - much more so than those of other religious figures. Few would speak ill of him, however simply refraining from rude comments about Christ does not mean that a person thinks rightly of him. Or of his claim to be Sovereign Lord. Most people might say that Jesus is a good example, but few would follow him as Lord. Scripture does not reveal him to merely give us an example of a nice way to live, so that we will feel better about ourselves. The Bible reveals Christ because apart from him we can never have a relationship with God. The best way to learn about Christ is to read the Gospels. There we find all we need to know about him. Every story about Christ reveals him as the only Saviour of sinners. As we journey through the Gospels we find ourselves walking in the shoes of the disciples. We share their understanding of Jesus. We are much like the disciples as we make our way through life, we grasp a little here, and a little there. It is through seeing the truth of Scripture, and wrestling with our questions like the disciples, and observing the Lord's work, that the Holy Spirit is pleased to reveal Christ to us. That is why we study the Gospels. We want our minds exposed to the revelation of Christ, and pray that the Holy Spirit might give understanding so that we truly see him as he is and follow him.

### **Prayers**

Lord, be merciful to your people. Fill us with your gifts and make us always eager to serve you in faith, hope, and love. Grant this through our Lord Jesus Christ, your Son, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, for ever and ever. Amen.

we'll live and speak his praise.

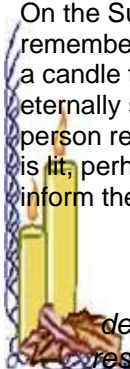
## Church News

The General Secretary of the Methodist Church has responded to the BBC Trust consideration of non-religious voices to be included on Radio 4's Thought For The Day.

Martyn Atkins, General Secretary of the Methodist Church, said: "Faith-based communities have a distinctive voice, and large numbers of people listen to Thought For The Day for that very reason, so I would be saddened to lose those crucial few minutes of spiritual reflection. I recognise, however, that faith-based communities do not have a monopoly on 'thoughts'!"

But we, along with other Christians, will hope to continue to be given opportunity to speak of the things that matter so deeply to us."

### Forces deserve Church support

THE newly appointed Bishop to the Forces, the Rt Revd Stephen Venner, called for the British public to maintain their support for service personnel in Afghanistan, after eight soldiers were killed in a 24-hour period last week.

Bishop Venner said it had "not been the quietest week to start", and that his "heart went out to the families who had lost loved ones" in recent days. The soldiers' deaths led to criticism of the Government's strategy in Afghanistan, with the Conservatives claiming that troops faced a severe shortage of military equipment. The Liberal Democrats said British strategy was "over-ambitious in aim, and under-resourced in practice". A total of 184 British personnel have died in Afghanistan since 2002.

Although he said he did not want to be drawn into political and moral questions about Afghanistan, Bishop Venner said "the Church needs to speak into this debate. "I think it's very important that, whatever your view about war, the British public show, as the people of Wootton Bassett have shown this week, that the soldiers and service personnel do have our support and admiration. My job is to get alongside the forces and their families, and, in particular, support the chaplains in the forces. I will be visiting troops in this country as requested and as required, and providing personal support to the three senior chaplains in the forces."

Bishop Venner has not ruled out a trip to Afghanistan if such a visit "could be helpful". He said he did not have information on whether the troops in Afghanistan were adequately resourced, but said he had followed the situation "in the papers, like everyone else. If we as a country send our service personnel to do a job for us, the very least they can expect from us is proper equipment and support."
