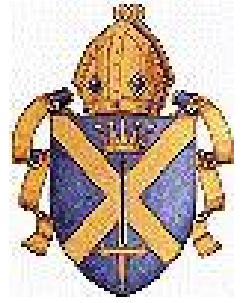

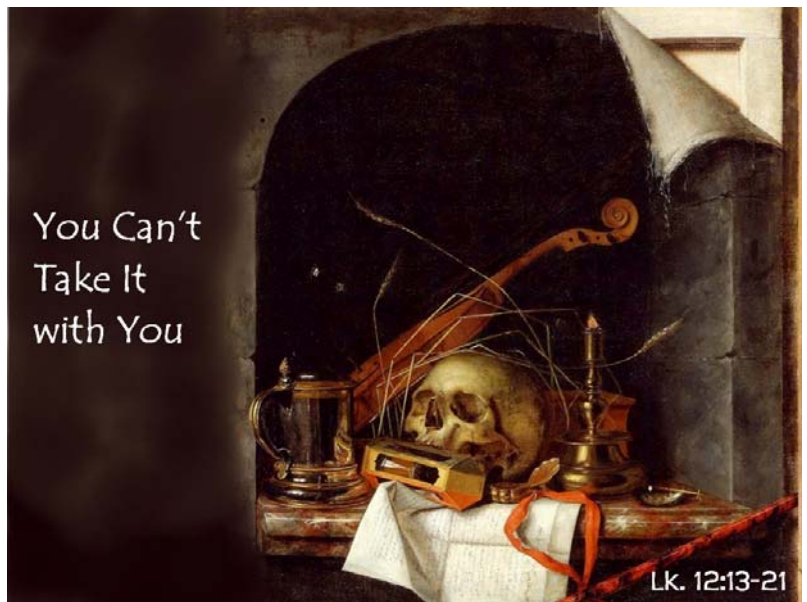

Old Testament Reading - Ecclesiastes 1: 2, 12-14, 2: 18-23

Meaningless! Meaningless!" says the Teacher. "Utterly meaningless! Everything is meaningless. I, the Teacher, was king over Israel in Jerusalem. I devoted myself to study and to explore by wisdom all that is done under heaven. What a heavy burden God has laid on men! I have seen all the things that are done under the sun; all of them are meaningless, a chasing after the wind. I hated all the things I had toiled for under the sun, because I must leave them to the one who comes after me. And who knows whether he will be a wise man or a fool? Yet he will have control over all the work into which I have poured my effort and skill under the sun. This too is meaningless. So my heart began to despair over all my toilsome labour under the sun. For a man may do his work with wisdom, knowledge and skill, and then he must leave all he owns to someone who has not worked for it. This too is meaningless and a great misfortune. What does a man get for all the toil and anxious striving with which he labours under the sun? All his days his work is pain and grief; even at night his mind does not rest. This too is meaningless (This is the word of the Lord -- **All: Thanks be to God**)

Epistle Reading –Col 3: 1-11

Since, then, you have been raised with Christ, set your hearts on things above, where Christ is seated at the right hand of God. Set your minds on things above, not on earthly things. For you died, and your life is now hidden with Christ in God. When Christ, who is your life, appears, then you also will appear with him in glory. Put to death, therefore, whatever belongs to your earthly nature: sexual immorality, impurity, lust, evil desires and greed, which is idolatry. Because of these, the wrath of God is coming. You used to walk in these ways, in the life you once lived. But now you must rid yourselves of all such things as these: anger, rage, malice, slander, and filthy language from your lips. Do not lie to each other, since you have taken off your old self with its practices and have put on the new self, which is being renewed in knowledge in the image of its Creator. Here there is no Greek or Jew, circumcised or uncircumcised, barbarian, Scythian, slave or free, but Christ is all, and is in all. (Reader This is the Word of the Lord, **All: Thanks be to God**)

Gospel Reading - Luke 12: 13-21

Someone in the crowd said to him, "Teacher, tell my brother to divide the inheritance with me." Jesus replied, "Man, who appointed me a judge or an arbiter between you?" Then he said to them, "Watch out! Be on your guard against all kinds of greed; a man's life does not consist in the abundance of his possessions." And he told them this parable: "The ground of a certain rich man produced a good crop. He thought to himself, 'What shall I do? I have no place to store my crops.' "Then he said, 'This is what I'll do. I will tear down my barns and build bigger ones, and

there I will store all my grain and my goods. And I'll say to myself, "You have plenty of good things laid up for many years. Take life easy; eat, drink and be merry." "But God said to him, 'You fool! This very night your life will be demanded from you. Then who will get what you have prepared for yourself?' "This is how it will be with anyone who stores up things for himself but is not rich toward God."

(Reader –This is the word of the Lord, **All: Thanks be to God**)

Commentary 'Balancing Values'

In today's gospel reading Jesus is continuing His journey to Jerusalem that he started back in Lk 9 v 51. On this journey Jesus has many interactions with the people he encounters and also continues to teach the disciples as they travel towards Jerusalem. Today, as he was teaching His disciples He appears to be interrupted by someone who wanted Him to resolve a family dispute over inheritance. To be asked to be a mediator in any kind of dispute was an honourable role in the Jewish culture of the time and Jesus responds with dignity, humility and very wise diplomacy to this request by asking who appointed Him as judge or arbiter between the two brothers.

Perhaps the request is based on the Mosaic Law precept that defines that an elder son should receive twice the inheritance of the younger, a concept which is backed up in the Mishnah, a book which expands the Jewish law and was much used by Rabbis in this kind of dispute. Perhaps the requestor just wanted to go 50:50 with his brother on their inheritance and was looking for Jesus to support him in his request. Perhaps he wanted Jesus to overturn the prevailing Jewish law. But there is clearly more to the story than this. Interestingly the man was not really asking for advice. He merely wanted Jesus to stand on his side and "tell my brother to divide the inheritance with me." He wanted Jesus to get the money for him. Not surprisingly Jesus sees through this pretence and points out to the man that what is at the heart of his request is not justice or arbitration but greed and a desire to

amass possessions. Jesus then uses the story of the farmer to illustrate the point, probably very fitting as He is almost certainly in a rural environment at the time. Life, Jesus point out, is not just about accumulating wealth and possessions for self satisfaction and enjoyment; it's also about the relationship we have with God. When we die, our wealth and possessions will mean nothing, but our relationship with God, through Christ, will be all important. Our future is always in God's hands and we must trust in Him for that future. It's very easy for us to be critical of the man who comes to Jesus, but it's also very easy for us to begin to fall into the same category as him. It would appear that the man is not a bad man, or even necessarily particularly greedy, he just wants what he believes to be fairly his. But as we've seen, at the centre of today's readings is not so much the theme of wealth and possessions but more our attitude to and pursuit of our material security. In today's materialistic world we can so easily get sidetracked into thinking that wealth and possessions are the ultimate route to security and independence. It's easy to believe that if we had a bit more money in the bank, if the mortgage was paid off, if our pension was a little larger, if we didn't have to pay so much tax that everything would be better as we would be better off. And it's true that wealth does appear to protect some people from the normal everyday vulnerabilities to some extent, and that lack of wealth can cause significant social and economic problems on a personal, local, national and international scale. But the reality is that we are created in God's

image and are therefore not dependent on our individual or national wealth but on each other and most particularly God Himself. It's not so much a question of what we possess, but what possesses us. In terms of the world as a whole, we are all wealthy in relative terms, and few, if any of us, live in real poverty. So it's easy to believe our security is to be found in the things we have worked hard for or inherited, and it's equally easy to be consumed by ensuring we have 'just a little more than' enough to get by. In one sense there is nothing wrong with wanting to have material possessions and security. God wants us to be wise stewards of the wealth and possessions He has given us. But we should not confuse being wise stewards with people who are consumed with the pursuit and protection of our own personal wealth. Ultimately we will answer to God when we die, as the final verse from our reading in Luke points out. Similarly, the writer of Ecclesiastes had experienced all that money can buy and ends up calling it 'vanity of vanities'. 'Meaningless', 'Fragile', 'Symbolic' or more colloquially 'Scotch Mist' are other words that have been used to translate this phrase. For him it brings no real gain, causes hard work, and must all be left behind when he dies. Ancestral inheritance was one of Judaism's central symbols and getting it right was part of obedience to God's will. The nation of Israel had traditionally prided itself on national identity and security, claiming for itself more and more 'ancestral' territory. Perhaps Israel had lost the true focus of their inheritance; an inheritance which was based on a covenant relationship with God, not just in promised lands and possessions. God wants us to enjoy life, but not without a relationship with Him. In the epistle reading Paul exhorts all followers of Christ to 'set your minds on things above, not on earthly things'. And it's as we set our minds on Him that we achieve the balance between current and future needs and using our money, and all that God has given us, wisely. And in so doing we come into our ultimate inheritance, the promise of eternal life. *Sam Cappleman*

Meditation

In one of his books Leo Tolstoy tells the story of a young Russian who inherits his father's small farm. He immediately starts dreaming of how to expand his property when one morning a well-dressed stranger visits him and makes him an offer that is too good to be true - he could have free of charge all the property he could walk around in one day. The only condition was that he returns to the same spot from which he started, the grave of his father, before the sun went down. Seeing the rich fields in the distance, he sets out without taking any food, water or provisions of any sort or even saying goodbye to his family. He thought he



could walk around and cover six square miles in a day. After a short while he decided to make it nine, then twelve and finally fifteen square miles. By noon he makes it to the halfway point. Though hungry with his legs aching he continues. He was near the point of exhaustion but the obsession to own the land drives him on. With only a few minutes left before the sun went down, he gathers all his strength, stumbles across the line, the new owner of fifteen square miles of land, and then collapses on the ground, dead. The stranger smiles and said, "I offered him all the land he could cover. Now you see what that is, six feet long by two feet wide, and I thought he would like to have the land close to his father's grave, rather than to have it anywhere else." Having said that, the stranger whose name is Death vanishes, saying "I have kept my pledge."
