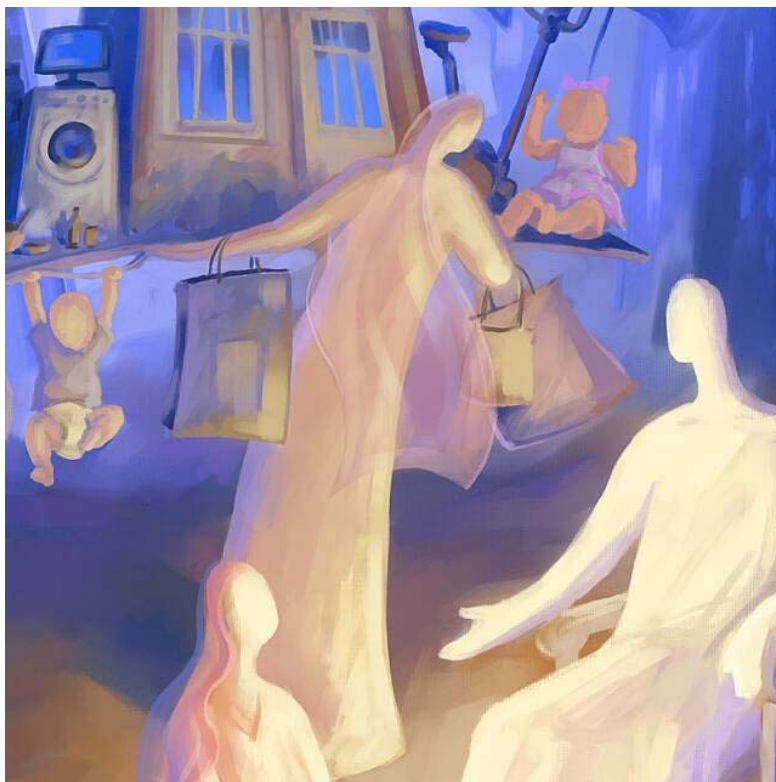
Collect Prayer for the Day

Martha and Mary

First Reading— Amos 8: 1-12 A Basket of Ripe Fruit

This is what the Sovereign Lord showed me: a basket of ripe fruit. "What do you see, Amos?" he asked. "A basket of ripe fruit," I answered. Then the Lord said to me, "The time is ripe for my people Israel; I will spare them no longer. "In that day," declares the Sovereign Lord, "the songs in the temple will turn to wailing. Many, many bodies—flung everywhere! Silence!" Hear this, you who trample the needy and do away with the poor of the land, saying, "When will the New Moon be over that we may sell grain, and the Sabbath be ended that we may market wheat?"—skimping on the measure, boosting the price and cheating with dishonest scales, buying the poor with silver and the needy for a pair of sandals, selling even the sweepings with the wheat. The Lord has sworn by himself, the Pride of Jacob: "I will never forget anything they have done. "Will not the land tremble for this, and all who live in it mourn? .The whole land will rise like the Nile; it will be stirred up and then sink like the river of Egypt. "In that day," declares the Sovereign Lord, "I will make the sun go down at noon and darken the earth in broad daylight. I will turn your religious festivals into mourning and all your singing into weeping. I will make all of you wear sackcloth and shave your heads. I will make that time like mourning for an only son and the end of it like a bitter day. "The days are coming," declares the Sovereign Lord, "when I will send a famine through the land—not a famine of food or a thirst for water, but a famine of hearing the words of the Lord. People will stagger from sea to sea and wander from north to east searching for the word of the Lord, but they will not find it. (This is the word of the Lord -- **Thanks be to God**)

Second Reading — Colossians Chapter 1:15-28

He is the image of the invisible God, the firstborn over all creation. For by him all things were created: things in heaven and on earth, visible and invisible, whether thrones or powers or rulers or authorities; all things were created by him and for him .He is before all things, and in him all things hold together. And he is the head of the body, the church; he is the beginning and the firstborn from among the dead, so that in everything he might have the supremacy. For God was pleased to have all his fullness dwell in him, and through him to reconcile to himself all things, whether things on earth or things in heaven, by making peace through his blood, shed on the cross. Once you were alienated from God and were enemies in your minds because of your evil behaviour. But now he has reconciled you by Christ's physical body through death to present you

holy in his sight, without blemish and free from accusation-- if you continue in your faith, established and firm, not moved from the hope held out in the gospel. This is the gospel that you heard and that has been proclaimed to every creature under heaven, and of which I, Paul, have become a servant. Now I rejoice in what was suffered for you, and I fill up in my flesh what is still lacking in regard to Christ's afflictions, for the sake of his body, which is the church. I have become its servant by the commission God gave me to present to you the word of God in its fullness- the mystery that has been kept hidden for ages and generations, but is now disclosed to the saints. To them God has chosen to make known among the Gentiles the glorious riches of this mystery, which is Christ in you, the hope of glory. We proclaim him, admonishing and teaching everyone with all wisdom, so that we may present everyone perfect in Christ. To this end I labour, struggling with all his energy, which so powerfully works in me.

(This is the word of the Lord - **Thanks be to God**)

Gospel Reading – Luke 10:38-42 (*When announced* **Glory to Christ our Saviour**)

As Jesus and his disciples were on their way, he came to a village where a woman named Martha opened her home to him. She had a sister called Mary, who sat at the Lord's feet listening to what he said. But Martha was distracted by all the preparations that had to be made. She came to him and asked, "Lord, don't you care that my sister has left me to do the work by myself? Tell her to help me!" "Martha, Martha," the Lord answered, "you are worried and upset about many things, but only one thing is needed. Mary has chosen what is better, and it will not be taken away from her."

Commentary

Until 1879, the University of Oxford was an exclusively male bastion of privilege and opportunity. In that year, 21 pioneering women quietly entered two recently established residential colleges of Lady Margaret Hall and Somerville - in the hope of attending lectures and pursuing a course of study. From the late 1870s, women had attended lectures, taken examinations, and had gained honours in those examinations. They were, however, unable to receive the degree to which their examinations would have entitled them. It was not until after 1920 that women were allowed to matriculate and the University voted in 1927 to impose a quota on the number of women. It was not until 1957 that the University made the decision to abolish by statute the quota. Liberal-minded dons initially had to go outside their colleges to offer lectures to women. Gradually, colleges did open their lecture halls to women students, as long as they were chaperoned. By 1906, all colleges theoretically admitted women to lectures, although individual dons could exclude them if they wished. At first, the University only allowed women to take special women's examinations, despite the argument that, if their higher education was ever to be taken seriously, then women should be judged by the same standards as men. As early as 1884, Oxford acknowledged the merit of the argument and permitted women to take some of the University honours examinations. This action was, however, accompanied by vigorous protest. Some feared that access to ancient literature and modern physiological research would be morally detrimental to young women. Others doubted that women's physical and mental health could endure the strain of taking university examinations. Emily Davies, an early campaigner for a woman's right to higher education and the founder of

Girton College, Cambridge, constantly fought the attitude that women were too delicate for protracted intellectual stimulation. She once exclaimed in exasperation: 'Women are expected to learn something of arithmetical science, and who shall say at what point they are to stop? Why should simple equations brighten their intellects, and quadratic equations drive them into a lunatic asylum?'

I mention this just to try and put in context what was going on in our Gospel story today. There might be several different themes but make no mistake it would be entirely different if we were talking about Mike and Maurice instead of Mary and Martha. The point is that these were two women and the church has never been convinced that women were up to the job of real learning and teaching and we have been more comfortable with them making the tea. The Church is still ill at ease with itself over women, the Church of England regularly makes a spectacle of itself by refusing to have women leaders and many different religions preclude women from the serious stuff which demands more intellectual rigour.

Now as we have read even if you only go back a hundred years, we recognise that it was not always considered appropriate for women to be involved in teaching and learning. So go back two thousand years to the home of Mary and Martha in Bethany and see how radical Jesus was when he took Mary a woman and spent time with her allowing her to 'sit at his feet.' We are told that Martha was listening to his word, she was assuming the role of a disciple and gaining instruction which would allow her to be involved in 'real ministry.' This is not Mary looking longingly into the eyes of Jesus, she wanted to study and learn, just like those early women at Oxford University. When we are told that the Apostle Paul 'sat at the feet of Gamaliel (Acts 22:3) it meant that he was a student of Gamaliel. To put it bluntly when you sat at the feet of a rabbi you were training to be a rabbi ! Now when that penny drops we can see just how ridiculous the arguments against women in ministry have been over the past years. We might quite rightly question how it could be that a movement based upon a teacher from Nazareth who broke all convention to train women in ministry, could end up specifically excluding women on grounds of their gender !

Martha was doing an exceptionally important thing preparing for those who were guests, but Jesus was not prepared to allow her need of help to be used as a justification for putting women into a box. Perhaps more crucially he was not prepared to allow human cultural prejudice to draw lines which excluded people. In one sense we all applaud and rejoice that Jesus breaks down barriers and social injustice and challenges divisions. However we need to ask ourselves how we would have reacted if Jesus systematically took apart social systems and years of cultural norms and expected gender roles?

We could spend much time from the Gospel reading today thinking about the juxtaposition of the contemplative life with the attitude of active service, but that would be a false dichotomy. We must recognise that Jesus is speaking about the importance of ministry and the fact that it was something which he endorsed for women. In the first century, other rabbis did not teach women. Outside of being instructed in their proper gender roles according to custom and law, women received no education. So please recognise that this is a shocking episode, one in which Jesus again shakes the foundations of society.

Highland Fling On August 14 John and Janet Day are setting off for the Scottish Highlands in their 1929 MG to participate in an MG

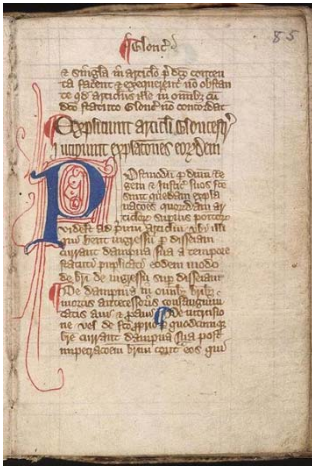

God provides. As Pope Francis recalled so memorably, we are to be a poor church for the poor. That means both provision and also prophetic challenge in a country that is still able and has the resources to reduce inequality - especially inequality of opportunity and life expectancy." General Synod has reaffirmed its commitment to women bishops and called, less than a year after the previous proposals were rejected, for new draft legislation to be introduced. It will be considered by the Synod in November 2013, with the aim of reaching the stage of Final Approval in July or November 2015. This was the first time Synod members had met since November 2012, when the previous draft legislation narrowly failed to secure the requisite majority in the House of Laity, despite enjoying the support of 73% of the Synod's members overall. The Synod reached its decision at the end of a day's debate, after its members had devoted much of an earlier day at Synod to facilitated discussions on the options available. Introducing the debate, the Rt Revd Nigel Stock, Bishop of St Edmundsbury and Ipswich, who chaired the Working Group set up by the House of Bishops to advise on new legislative proposals, said, "I believe that option one, together with a mandatory mediation process and including as it does a declaration or, possibly, Act of Synod deserves to be taken very seriously as a means to provide the basis for securing the necessary majorities in the lifetime of this Synod." The House of Bishops had recommended that draft legislation be prepared on that basis described as 'option one' in the report of the Working Group. That involved:
 - a measure and amending canon that made it lawful for women to become bishops;- the repeal of the statutory rights to pass Resolutions A and B under the Priests (Ordination of Women) Measure 1993, plus the rescinding of the Episcopal Ministry Act of Synod 1993; and - arrangements for those who, as a matter of theological conviction, are unable to receive the ministry of women bishops or priests, set out either in a declaration from the House of Bishops or in a new Act of Synod. Accepting the proposal made by the House, the General Synod passed the motion, by 319 votes to 84.
