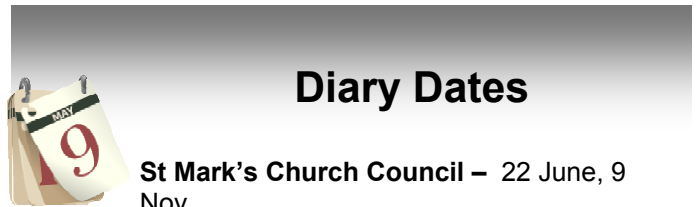

Opening Verses of Scripture Ps 133 v 1

First Bible Reading –Job 38: 1-11

Then the LORD answered Job out of the storm. He said: "Who is this that darkens my counsel with words without knowledge? Brace yourself like a man; I will question you, and you shall answer me. "Where were you when I laid the earth's foundation? Tell me, if you understand. Who marked off its dimensions? Surely you know! Who stretched a measuring line across it? On what were its footings set, or who laid its cornerstone-- while the morning stars sang together and all the angels shouted for joy? "Who shut up the sea behind doors when it burst forth from the womb, when I made the clouds its garment and wrapped it in thick darkness, when I fixed limits for it and set its doors and bars in place, when I said, 'This far you may come and no farther; here is where your proud waves halt'? (Reader : This is the word of the Lord. **All: Thanks be to God**)



Second Reading - 2 Corinthians 6: 1-13

As God's fellow workers we urge you not to receive God's grace in vain. For he says, "In the time of my favour I heard you, and in the day of salvation I helped you." I tell you, now is the time of God's favour, now is the day of salvation. We put no stumbling block in anyone's path, so that our ministry will not be discredited. Rather, as servants of God we commend ourselves in every way: in great endurance; in troubles, hardships and distresses; in beatings, imprisonments and riots; in hard work, sleepless nights and hunger; in purity, understanding, patience and kindness; in the Holy Spirit and in sincere love; in truthful speech and in the power of God; with weapons of righteousness in the right hand and in the left; through glory and dishonour, bad report and good report; genuine, yet regarded as impostors; known, yet regarded as unknown; dying, and yet we live on; beaten, and yet not killed; sorrowful, yet always rejoicing; poor, yet making many rich; having nothing, and yet possessing everything. We have spoken freely to you, Corinthians, and opened wide our hearts to you. We are not withholding our affection from you, but you are withholding yours from us. As a fair exchange--I speak as to my children--open wide your hearts also.

(Reader: This is the word of the Lord. **All: Thanks be to God**)

Gospel Reading –Mark 4: 35-41 (When announced All: Glory to Christ our Saviour)

That day when evening came, he said to his disciples, "Let us go over to the other side." Leaving the crowd behind, they took him along, just as he was, in the boat. There were also other boats with him. A furious squall came up, and the waves broke over the boat, so that it was nearly swamped. Jesus was in the stern, sleeping on a cushion. The disciples woke him and said to him, "Teacher, don't you care if we drown?" He got up, rebuked the wind and said to the waves, "Quiet! Be still!" Then the wind died down and it was completely calm. He said to his disciples, "Why are you so afraid? Do you still have no faith?" They were terrified and asked each other, "Who is this? Even the wind and the waves obey him!"

Mediation

Job and the disciples, as have many people through the ages, asked 'Where is God in my suffering and hardship?', 'Where is He when I need Him most?', 'Doesn't God care that I'm in danger and everything's going wrong?'. Sometimes it can be difficult to see God or understand His actions, or lack of it as it sometimes seems. Busy as He is, I sometimes suspect God feels a lonely God as He waits for our prayers and our engagement with Him so He can bring peace and calm out of our storms. God does care about the situations each one of us finds ourselves in, however difficult or trying they are. He also wants us to share in His cosmic purpose for the world and understand more about how we fit into bringing His Kingdom to completion on earth. God is not a vindictive God, He does not wish bad things to happen to anyone, that not a part of His loving and forgiving nature. Similarly, our tough times are not part of some kind of divine retribution because we have done wrong or disobeyed Him. Suffering, hardship and pain happen because we are part of a fallen and imperfect world to which God sent His Son to bring redemption and salvation. Sometimes as part of that redeeming work we share in His pain.

Commentary

The book of Job is often seen as one of the greatest poetical literary pieces of writing in the world. It was probably written around the 5th century BC and seems to reflect a time before the organised priesthood; Job himself reminds us of Abraham and the patriarchs. It's perhaps an ancient story that has been used by a later wisdom writer to explore the place of pain and suffering in the world. Unfortunately the book of Job is also often widely misunderstood. The book gives us a structured dialogue between Job and his well meaning but wrong friends and comforters named Bildad, Zophar and Eliphaz. Elihu, who comes along later, is a little better and defends God's superior knowledge and ways but still way off the mark regarding Job's suffering and the work and wisdom of God. All of Job's friends have the view that everything that happens to a person in life, good or bad, is a direct result of whether that individual has pleased God or not. Some people still think like this today. The friends can't understand when Job, who we know to be an upright and righteous man, protests his innocence with great eloquence and states that he has done nothing to deserve the miseries that have been inflicted on him. Job's trials include bereavement, prolonged physical suffering and illness, and acute financial hardship, quite a testing for anyone, but especially for someone who is described in the first chapter of the book as 'the richest man in the East'. In line with the prevailing thinking and orthodox theology of the time, the friends insist that Job must have seriously sinned against God and done wrong for all these things to happen to him. They argue that if Job the person he makes himself out to be then God would have continued to richly bless him, constantly rewarding him for doing good by giving him the benefits of long life, children and material rewards, all of which now seem to have been taken away from him. On the contrary, if Job is suffering he must be a wicked man. They urge Job to make a clean breast of it, confess his sin and admit that God does indeed administer a just and fair world and one in which we all get what we deserve. But Job shows that his faith is not so superficially thin and counters their arguments time and time again and puts forward the perspective that life is not always fair and that the world is not always how God wants it to be. Through his trials and suffering, even though he clearly felt abandoned by God at times, Job's faith deepens as he begins to understand more about who God really is.

The central issue of the book of Job still challenges us today. If God is all powerful and good, why do evil and natural disasters happen and why does God allow good and innocent people to suffer? Why isn't the world how God wants it to be? As we have seen, the arguments go back and forth between Job and his friends going nowhere. It's not until the climax of the book and God Himself intervenes in the debate, the passage we have in today's reading, that a resolution to this impasse is revealed. God, who speaks to Job and His friends out of 'the tempest' and the turmoil, rather than answer Job's questions directly simply reveals His glory and His nature to them, telling them of the wonders of the universe and His creation. He corrects the friends' misconceptions and puts the situation into perspective. As God speaks Job realises that even if the theology and philosophy of life held by his friends is too narrow and presents too a restrictive picture of God, his own concept of God has been far too small. The world's wisdom is

seemingly very logical but incorrect. There are many things in life which will never be understood. God works on a different plane to human beings, a plane that we only glimpse occasionally and never fully comprehend. Through the words that God speaks He vindicates Job's position against the perceived wisdom of the world as articulated by his so called friends.

The disciples too were capable of thinking like Job's friends when they were in the boat together with Jesus. Didn't Jesus care that they were in danger? Just as God did not answer Job's questions neither does Jesus reply directly to the disciples. But just like God, Jesus demonstrates His glory and authority over the natural world in response to the unfathomable situation. It seemed natural to the disciples that if God is in control of the world then everything that happens in it must be according to His will and everything would be fine for them from here to eternity. The reality, which not just the book of Job and the gospel of Mark but the whole bible teaches, is that many things happen in life which are not as God wishes them to be. Paul in his epistle to the Romans is very clear that suffering is not the result of sin. He stresses that 'All that we suffer in this life is nothing in comparison with the glory which is destined to be disclosed for us' (Rom 8 v 18). The crucifixion of Christ on the cross is the ultimate outworking of this as we see the suffering to death of the only truly righteous person who ever lived. The cross more importantly shows that whatever the suffering, God does prevail. When all seemed lost, Christ arose from the dead, ascended back into heaven to be with His Father whilst leaving His Spirit with us to comfort and strengthen us in all our circumstances. Things that we can never understand do happen in our broken and fallen world. Life can be full of uncertainty, apparently meaningless suffering, hardships and all kinds of contradictions. Ultimately Job accepts this, admitting that he had spoken of things he did not understand. We too sometimes need to turn our thoughts away from ourselves and this world to reflect on God's character and personality and respond in trust and worship as Job eventually did on his knees. *Sam Cappleman*

The Archbishop of Canterbury is urging churches to pray for the planet and campaign for climate change in the run up to the important UN talks later this year in Copenhagen. Dr Williams said it was vital for Christians and people of all faiths to take a lead in praying and campaigning for action. A new deal at the UN summit could directly improve the lives of the world's poor whose living conditions are affected by climate change. World Environment Day marks the third anniversary of the Church of England's environmental campaign Shrinking the Footprint, helping churches, cathedrals and other buildings reduce their energy footprint. The next phase of the campaign focusing on water and biodiversity will also be unveiled. Nearly all dioceses now have an environment officer with many promoting their own green policies to cut the carbon in every parish. The Archbishop will commend a range of green projects already supported by local churches from a bicycle and rickshaw scheme to solar panels on a medieval church building. The Bishop of London the Rt Revd Richard Chartres Chair of Shrinking the Footprint said: "Climate change is a global challenge, the impact of which is being felt first by some of the most vulnerable communities on our planet. Loving our neighbour in the 21st Century demands that we should be involved in the effort to mitigate climate change and to help our neighbours to adapt. "Environment Sunday is a time for us to reflect on the challenges ahead and to look forward to the Shrinking the Footprint event on the 11th June 2009. This will both provide an opportunity to deepen our own commitment and to engage with our politicians".
