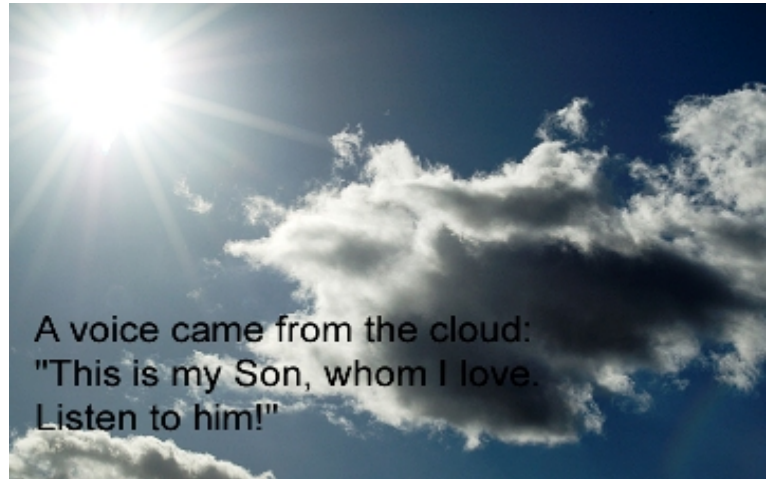

First Bible Reading 2 Kings 2:1-12

When the LORD was about to take Elijah up to heaven in a whirlwind, Elijah and Elisha were on their way from Gilgal. Elijah said to Elisha, "Stay here; the LORD has sent me to Bethel." But Elisha said, "As surely as the LORD lives and as you live, I will not leave you." So they went down to Bethel. The company of the prophets at Bethel came out to Elisha and asked, "Do you know that the LORD is going to take your master from you today?" "Yes, I know," Elisha replied, "but do not speak of it." Then Elijah said to him, "Stay here, Elisha; the LORD has sent me to Jericho." And he replied, "As surely as the LORD lives and as you live, I will not leave you." So they went to Jericho. The company of the prophets at Jericho went up to Elisha and asked him, "Do you know that the LORD is going to take your master from you today?" "Yes, I know," he replied, "but do not speak of it." Then Elijah said to him, "Stay here; the LORD has sent me to the Jordan." And he replied, "As surely as the LORD lives and as you live, I will not leave you." So the two of them walked on. Fifty men of the company of the prophets went and stood at a distance, facing the place where Elijah and Elisha had stopped at the Jordan. Elijah took his cloak, rolled it up and struck the water with it. The water divided to the right and to the left, and the two of them crossed over on dry ground. When they had crossed, Elijah said to Elisha, "Tell me, what can I do for you before I am taken from you?" "Let me inherit a double portion of your spirit," Elisha replied. "You have asked a difficult thing," Elijah said, "yet if you see me when I am taken from you, it will be yours--otherwise not." As they were walking along and talking together, suddenly a chariot of fire and horses of fire appeared and separated the two of them, and Elijah went up to heaven in a whirlwind. Elisha saw this and cried out, "My father! My father! The chariots and horsemen of Israel!" And Elisha saw him no more. Then he took hold of his own clothes and tore them apart.. (Reader: This is the word of the Lord – **Thanks be to God**)

Second Reading 2 Corinthians Chapter 4:3-6

And even if our gospel is veiled, it is veiled to those who are perishing. The god of this age has blinded the minds of unbelievers, so that they cannot see the light of the gospel of the glory of Christ, who is the image of God. For we do not preach ourselves, but Jesus Christ as Lord, and ourselves as your servants for Jesus' sake. For God, who said, "Let light shine out of darkness," made his light shine in our hearts to give us the light of the knowledge of the glory of God in the face of Christ. (Reader: This is the word of the Lord – **Thanks be to God**)

Gospel Reading Mark 9:2-9

After six days Jesus took Peter, James and John with him and led them up a high mountain, where they were all alone. There he was transfigured before them. His clothes became dazzling white, whiter than anyone in the world could bleach them. And there appeared before them Elijah and Moses, who were talking with Jesus. Peter said to Jesus, "Rabbi, it is good for us to be here. Let us put up three shelters--one for you, one for Moses and one for Elijah." (He did not know what to say, they were so frightened.) Then a cloud appeared and enveloped them, and a voice came from the cloud: "This is my Son, whom I love. Listen to him!" Suddenly, when they looked around, they no

longer saw anyone with them except Jesus. As they were coming down the mountain, Jesus gave them orders not to tell anyone what they had seen until the Son of Man had risen from the dead. (Reader: This is the word of the Lord – **Thanks be to God**)

Post Communion Prayer

Commentary

Christians are often referred to as Pilgrims. That is because the Christian life can be viewed as a journey. Christians believe that when we are done with this world we go to be with God, in a place which is regarded as our spiritual home. Upon that journey we find times when we are full of hope and excitement, and other times when life seems hard and our faith is tested. In the passage from Mark today the disciples are given a glimpse of the majesty of God, it will make them feel great - but it has a much deeper purpose - it will serve to sustain them when times are hard. The Christian is therefore prepared in advance that the road may become rough and steep. It is at such times that we must remain even more firmly fixed on Jesus our Saviour.

The episode today recorded in the Gospel of Mark has been called 'a window into a different world.' The recent film of 'The Lion the witch and the wardrobe.' by C.S. Lewis is a wonderful story of three children and their adventure in the magical land of Narnia. It is a children's book but also very grown up. It causes us to question whether there is another world. Many people are oblivious to a spiritual world, they are mindful of and governed only by the ordinary and the mundane.

This episode reminds us

1. That there is a place beyond our own time
2. That there is a spiritual realm.
3. That when we die we go to meet with God and exist in his presence.

Interestingly of course Moses had not entered the promised land, yet now here he was clearly alive in God's promised land. For those considering what happens when we die this may be an interesting piece of scripture to remember. In this place clearly Moses and Elijah are presented as alive in God.

Christian are called pilgrims for many reasons, one of them is because we believe that we are on our way to another home, a kingdom which is not of this world, whose values are different. Success is to be measured in very different terms. We are to have hope and judge ourselves by the values of that Kingdom

Jesus had spoken to his disciples of death and suffering and they were afraid. Then the disciples saw Moses and Elijah! They must have been terrified. Here were two great pillars of the Jewish faith, men who it was believed had been spared death in the normal way. The disciples feared over so much, they were paralysed with fear, we too can be fearful without need. There is much over which we can be afraid, this episode gave the disciples something which would give them strength in the days ahead. This was an opportunity upon which they could reflect. This moment was something which they could not hold onto in time, but they could hold it in their hearts and draw strength from it. It was a God - given encouragement. So it was to be Peter spoke about it later: we had been eyewitnesses of his majesty [2 Peter 1:16-18]. It empowered them for service

We have all had some experience of the wonder of God. Sometimes it comes to us through the appreciation of nature, sometimes, indeed, on a mountain. But we all have to come back down the mountain and get on with real life, and most of our time is spent at the bottom of the mountain in the valleys of life. The ministry of Jesus could not be conducted from the mountain top, it was instead something carried out on the cross of suffering. But when the disciples were tempted to give up and think that the Christian service to which they were called was a hopeless cause, they were to look back and remember Christ as they knew him in the Transfiguration, clothed in glory.

Some of the details of the story are worth mentioning. Mountains were important places. If we think back in the Bible we will remember Moriah, Horeb, and Sinai. These were important mountains upon which God was made known. Moriah was where Isaac was nearly sacrificed, on Sinai Moses received the law and at Horeb Elijah met God.

We are told by Mark that the clothes of Jesus became 'stilbein.' This is a word which is used for the bright appearance of gold or shining polished steel. We are reminded of the shekinah, the divine presence. In

Jewish thought the presence of God is often associated with the appearance of cloud. Remember this is where Moses met God. When Solomon dedicated the Temple it was filled with cloud. By including the presence of cloud, Mark was saying something important about the presence of God with Jesus. This was important because Jesus had just been to Caesarea Philippi and determined to go to Jerusalem to die. This was a signal that God was with Jesus in this decision, he was following the path of God. This was confirmed by the presence of Moses the law giver and Elijah who represented the prophets. Everything that had gone before was now finding fulfilment in Jesus.

It is important for us to try and understand how significant this would have been for the disciples. They had no doubt been shattered by the decision of Jesus that he would go to die in Jerusalem. Now here was a scene in which they could receive assurance that Jesus had made the right decision. For a moment the cloak which divides our material world from the spiritual realm is drawn back for the disciples and they are able to receive a glimpse of the 'other side.' Many people would want to see the incident as some kind of hallucination, but this is to miss the point. In some ways this story is not unique. Throughout the ages there are times when many Christians have been able to speak of having experienced the reality of God presence in a manner which is extraordinary and convincing. There are occasions when the curtain is pulled back momentarily and that which we hope for, which lies unseen is confirmed in a dramatic way. We should be sceptical of such reports, we should not expect them to come often, nevertheless they are true and we should rejoice that there are those who are able to speak of them and reassure us all in times when the valleys seem so much lower than the mountain tops.

God's grace is shown in such moments. By such tokens we are sustained in times of need or prepared for future service. God's grace is sufficient for us, for our empowerment, not for our enjoyment. God gives to our needs, not our greeds, the spiritual uplifting is to sustain us, not for our indulgence. *Charles Royden*

Meditation

Two thirds of 18-24 year-olds want more hours in the day. Ever feel that there simply aren't enough hours in the day? If you're a member of the younger generation, chances are you'd like more time to squeeze in your to-do list. In a YouGov survey commissioned by the British Methodist Church, participants were asked how much more time they would like in the day in order to get everything done and have a little extra time for themselves. 65% of 18 to 24 year-olds said they would like more time in the day, with 28% wishing for at least a 27-hour day. But the older generation (aged 55+) proved more relaxed, with 69% saying they were happy with the day as it stands.

But the Church is challenging people to spend a small amount of time making a big difference to the way they live their lives with its Still Time Lent campaign. The campaign is supported by a website www.methodist.org.uk/stilltime where people can sign up to receive daily email reflections and challenges from five different contributors. They can also share their experiences and thoughts on a the Still Time Facebook group.

Contributor Revd Dr Mark Wakelin, said; "Some of us would love to have more hours in the day, but it's amazing the difference that we can make in just five minutes. Still Time is about using our time wisely in order to enhance every area of life." Each day of the week will have a different focus, with 'time for you' on Mondays, followed by 'time for others', 'time for God', 'time to share' and finishing the week with 'time to act'. "Still Time is a challenge to all who have given up, feel rushed off their feet, or think it's simply too late to do things differently", continued Mark. "Still Time is about making time that gives us 'eternity in our hearts'. There's still time for others, for ourselves, for God – still time to make a difference in the world and begin to discover the people we were always meant to be.'

A Special Invitation for Ash Wednesday.

The Ash Wednesday service will take place at St Mark's Church on Wednesday 25 February at 7.30pm. We look forward to welcoming friends from the Methodist Circuit, the preacher is The Reverend Eric Royden.

Every year, 46 days before Easter, we have an Ash Wednesday Service at St Mark's. This marks the beginning of Lent. In these days of rushing about taking care of the business of life, Lent is a time when Christians try to make space for reflection and consideration of the important spiritual realities of life. This year we hope that you will be able to join us as we pause to consider how we may each prepare for Easter over the coming weeks.

The Ash Wednesday Service

The service draws on the ancient Biblical traditions of covering one's head with ashes, wearing sackcloth, and fasting. We don't usually wear sackcloth but we do recognise the solemnity of the occasion by making a small symbolic mark in ash on our foreheads. The ash is formed by burning palm crosses from the previous year. Palm Sunday celebrates the triumphant entry of Jesus into Jerusalem. When we convert the palm crosses to ashes, we are reminded that the crowd which cheered Jesus, soon let him down. We seek to be faithful to Jesus in a troubled world.

When the minister marks each worshipper on the forehead, words are spoken based on Genesis 3:19. *'Remember you are dust and unto dust you shall return'*,

At baptism the Christian is marked on the forehead with the sign of the cross. The marking of the forehead with a cross made of ashes reminds us of our baptism and at least three other things:

1. Death comes to everyone
2. We should be sorry and sad for our sins
3. We must change for the better

God made the first human being by breathing life into dust, and without God, human beings are nothing more than dust and ashes. The ash cross reminds us of our mortality and encourages repentance. *'God our Father, you create us from the dust of the earth. Grant that these ashes may be for us a sign of our penitence, and a symbol of our mortality.'*

The good news The service is quiet and reflective but it is also good news and not an occasion to be sad. Christians believe that the death of Christ on the cross brings forgiveness of sins. The cross of ashes shows our trust in that promise. We are sorry for past failure but we are determined that trusting in God we will seek to live each day by the teachings of Jesus.

A sad loss. Members of both churches will be disappointed to hear of the death of Ada Hill a long standing member at St Mark's Church. Ada died peacefully in her sleep whilst staying at Moggerhanger. Until very recently she was living at home and was grateful for the kind support of all her friends at church. her funeral will be held on 2 March

Lent Book Reviews

The Things He Carried: Stephen Cottrell £6.99
 Stephen Cottrell is Bishop of Reading and before ordination worked in the film industry. This brief book explores the narrative of Holy Week and vividly brings home the reality of the Passion story by considering the things that Jesus carried on His journey to the cross including not only physical items such as the crown of thorns and the seamless robe but also more eternal issues such as the hopes of God and the sins of the world. This is not a book of daily readings for each day in Lent but its strength lies in the suggestions for reflection after each short section. These can be done either as a group or by individuals themselves in a time of quiet and contemplation. The introduction states that 'In order to understand the cross you need to stand under it... with the imagination as well as the mind' This book can certainly help in this process, especially if time is taken to reflect and pray using the helpful outlines provided.

Why go to Church: Timothy Radcliffe £9.99
 Why Go to Church is the Archbishop of Canterbury's Lent book for 2009. As a result of this I'm sure it will sell well. However, I found this book very disappointing. Timothy Radcliffe, who until recently was Master of the Dominican Order and won accolades and awards for his previous book 'What is the Point of Being a Christian', has followed and build on that publication with this book for Lent. Building on the (true and real) premise that the Eucharist works at a deep level to transform our humanity so that we share more of God's life within us, this book makes extensive use of personal experience and literary and theological quotes to develop this theme, expanding the shape and drama that is the Eucharist. There are some profound insights in this book such as 'The Eucharist is a mystery not because it is mysterious, but because it is a sign of God's secret purpose, which is to unite all things in Christ', but they do seem to take some digging out. It's perhaps a book to take a few pages at a time each day in Lent and one which will be enjoyed by those who are stimulated by literature and a more challenging read.

As an alternative to reading a specific lent book why not try reading the same book of the bible each day through Lent. Some of Paul's shorter letters such as Philippians or Colossians are ideal for this, or even the letters of John which are even shorter. For the more ambitious there is always Hebrews or even Mark, the shortest gospel and the gospel of the current church year. *Sam*
