Second Reading -1 Thessalonians 2:1-8

You know, brothers, that our visit to you was not a failure. We had previously suffered and been insulted in Philippi, as you know, but with the help of our God we dared to tell you his gospel in spite of strong opposition. For the appeal we make does not spring from error or impure motives, nor are we trying to trick you. On the contrary, we speak as men approved by God to be entrusted with the gospel. We are not trying to please men but God, who tests our hearts. You know we never used flattery, nor did we put on a mask to cover up greed—God is our witness. We were not looking for praise from men, not from you or anyone else. As apostles of Christ we could have been a burden to you, but we were gentle among you, like a mother caring for her little children. We loved you so much that we were delighted to share with you not only the gospel of God but our lives as well, because you had become so dear to us.

Gospel Reading - Matthew 22:34-46

Hearing that Jesus had silenced the Sadducees, the Pharisees got together. One of them, an expert in the law, tested him with this question: "Teacher, which is the greatest commandment in the Law?"

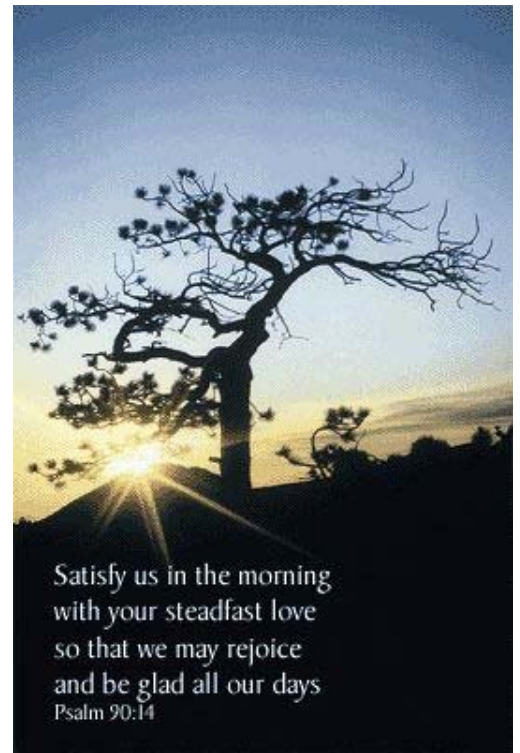
Jesus replied: "'Love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your mind.' This is the first and greatest commandment. And the second is like it: 'Love your neighbour as yourself.' All the Law and the Prophets hang on these two commandments."

While the Pharisees were gathered together, Jesus asked them, "What do you think about the Messiah? Whose son is he?" "The son of David," they replied.

He said to them, "How is it then that David, speaking by the Spirit, calls him 'Lord'? For he says, "'The Lord said to my Lord: 'Sit at my right hand until I put your enemies under your feet.'"

If then David calls him 'Lord,' how can he be his son?" No one could say a word in reply, and from that day on no one dared to ask him any more questions.

Commentary

Last week we saw the Pharisees ask about paying taxes to Caesar, hoping to get Jesus in trouble with the Roman equivalent of our Inland Revenue and Customs. They failed in that attempt. Next the Sadducees came up with a clever question about marriage in heaven. Jesus neatly sidesteps also this trap. So this week the Pharisees' turn again and ask him about the Law of God. "Teacher, which is the greatest commandment?"

It's an innocent-looking question but really it is a stealth attempt to make Jesus look like a theological liberal. If Jesus picked out any of the Bible's commandments and elevated it to the status of number 1, that would imply that he was treating everything else as second-class. If you are the father of five children and one of them asks you who your favourite is, a wise father says, "I love you all the same." No good parent wants any child to feel like he or she plays second fiddle to the other siblings. So also here: if they can trick Jesus into picking a favourite commandment, he'll be guilty of downplaying other commandments. But since every commandment represents the very word of God, picking and choosing among them would be heretical.

Jesus knows what is going on. An easy way to get off this hook would have been for Jesus to say, "Every Word that proceeds from the mouth of the Lord is great. Each commandment is great." That would have been an effective way out of this, a theological version of the "I love you all the same" answer a wise parent might give to the question of which child is the parent's favourite. But instead Jesus begins to quote a Bible verse, and at first the Pharisees maybe thought they had him. They didn't. Because Jesus says that love of God is the greatest of all commandments.

After all, if you don't love God, you won't be much inclined to keep any commandment. If, however, you do love God, then the rest follows naturally. And just to make the point, Jesus throws in the second commandment about neighbour-love. Between these two loves, Jesus manages to catch every single commandment you could ever name. Every commandment in the book has something to do with either God or neighbour.

But Jesus' reply was actually more clever than even that. Because in Jewish circles the single most famous verse is the so-called Shema from Deuteronomy 6. "Shema" is the Hebrew word for "hear" or "listen" and it comes from that verse, "Hear, O Israel, the Lord your God is one. Love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your strength." The Shema was traditionally recited by every Jewish child and adult at the start of each day and at the conclusion of each day. In other words, there was no single verse from the entire Torah that the average Jew knew better than this one. So when Jesus responds to the Pharisees' tricky question by quoting a portion of the Shema, he was throwing back in their faces something they took to be exceedingly basic, something that was second-nature to even the youngest Jewish child. It reminds you of the time Karl Barth is said to have been asked what he thought was the most profound of all theological truths. But instead of giving some jargon-laden, academic answer that used words like perichoresis, kenosis, or the insuperable transcendence of God's prevenient grace as it comes through the vicarious supererogation of the Son, Barth simply said, "Jesus loves me this I know, for the Bible tells me so."

That answer was charming and disarming. Barth said, "The greatest truth is the one you already know, the one all Christians know, the one a three-year old can sing about." In Jesus' case, he was slyly insulting the Pharisees, demonstrating to everyone there that the Pharisees were not really interested in seeing if Jesus could answer their question since even the youngest person there knew that answer already. This was not a difficult question. It was like asking Albert Einstein, "Do you know what 2+2 is?" This was basic, elementary. And in this case Jesus makes it clear that just asking that question makes the ones posing the question look like the ignorant and foolish ones.

Meditation

Matthew this week describes the trap set by the Pharisees. His answer "Love the Lord your God with all you are and your neighbour as yourself. From this all the law and prophets hang." These are the kinds of commandments that define all others, in law and prophets, and all others provide guidance for fulfilling these.

Christians are, indeed, called "to love and serve the world." We say the prayer at the end of the service, 'Send us out into the world, to live and work to your praise and glory'. We are sent out to put into practice what we have said in worship. Ours are the only hands and feet that Christ has now, as the sixteenth-century mystic and Carmelite reformer Teresa of Avila said.

When we are sent out into the world, when we heed God's command to love our neighbours as ourselves, we need to ask what that relationship between the Church and the world means. Christianity has always had a paradoxical attitude to the world, and the doctrine of the Incarnation bears it out. On the one hand, God so loved the world that God sent his only begotten son, who healed the sick, fed the poor, raised the dead and lived, preached, ate and made friends in the world alongside ordinary human beings, especially those on the margins of society. On the other hand, those actions of Jesus of Nazareth meant that he eventually came into conflict with the world, as he challenged human priorities and institutions.

As a consequence, many Christians have had a negative view of the world. Some, like the Amish, have chosen to stay away from it, building separate, gathered, utopian communities. They would agree with the author of the epistle to Diognetus, in the middle of the second century, that Christians "live in their own countries, but only as resident aliens."

Other Christians have assumed that the world is a very bad place, because it is fallen, but they are committed to making it more 'godly,' chiefly by converting as many people as possible to Christianity. For them, individual sinners must be saved in order to redeem the world.

Yet other Christians still assume that the world is a bad place, but believe that Christians can make it better: we can build the kingdom of heaven on earth. These Christians do not withdraw from the world, nor do they simply try to grow their own ranks. They get their hands dirty to change things. This perspective has provided the impetus for many wonderful projects, but it has, at times, been paternalistic, assuming still that Christianity has all the answers.

But what if loving our neighbour means that we need to listen to the world and engage with it? What if we realize we do not need to bring Christ to the world, because Christ is already in the world? This creates a different model of loving our neighbour, which is much more about Christians being vulnerable, listening, participating.

The gospel stresses the link between love of neighbour and love of God. It's clear in Matthew's gospel that God is in others. Jesus is the divine presence in our midst and, for example, in a later parable (25:31-46) acts of love towards him are done by loving neighbour ("As you did it unto the least of my sisters and brothers....")

Jesus' teaching about love of God and neighbour can cause us to feel all-too-human and inadequate. The love Jesus describes asks everything of us. The first part of the teaching requires, "All your heart, with All your soul, and with All your mind." This is the biblical way of summarizing the whole person. It leaves no wiggle room, and will not allow watering down. Loving God and loving neighbour is a way of giving the full gift of ourselves in service to God. Jesus' teaching isn't about how we feel about God and neighbour, but what we will do. Since the type of love he has in mind is not an emotion, not a "falling in love," it can be commanded. This teaching is woven throughout the gospel of Matthew; it's what Jesus asks his disciples to do if they would follow him. "Deny self, pick up your cross and follow me" (10:38-39). It seems that the only practical sign that we love God is that we love our neighbour.

Prayers for Sunday and the week ahead

Unite our hearts, O Lord, in bonds of affection that we may live with one another in humility and peace. Give us patience in the time of trial, and steadfastness in the tasks before us. Refresh our hearts in the hour of anguish and sustain us in the day of our need. Be to us, and to your whole Church, both our everlasting light and our eternal salvation; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen *Bernard Albert, 1569-1636*

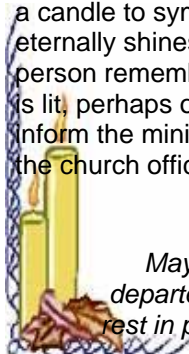
