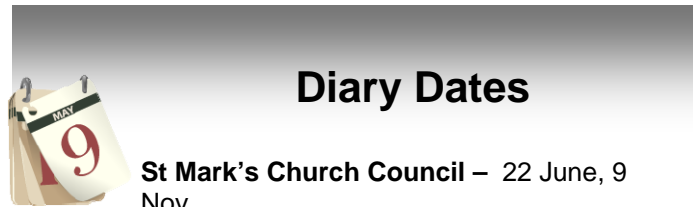

Easter 7—Ascension

Opening Verse Eph 1 v 20

He raised him from the dead and seated him at his right hand in the heavenly realms, far above all rule and authority, power and dominion, and every title that can be given, not only in the present age but also in the one to come.

Collect Prayer for the Day —

Before we read we pray

Risen, ascended Lord, as we rejoice at your triumph, fill your Church on earth with power and compassion, that all who are estranged by sin may find forgiveness and know your peace, to the glory of God the Father.

Common Worship Shorter Collect - Seventh Sunday after Easter



First Bible Reading -Acts 1:15–17, 21-26

In those days Peter stood up among the believers (a group numbering about a hundred and twenty) and said, “Brothers, the Scripture had to be fulfilled which the Holy Spirit spoke long ago through the mouth of David concerning Judas, who served as guide for those who arrested Jesus— he was one of our number and shared in this ministry.” Therefore it is necessary to choose one of the men who have been with us the whole time the Lord Jesus went in and out among us, beginning from John’s baptism to the time when Jesus was taken up from us. For one of these must become a witness with us of his resurrection.”

So they proposed two men: Joseph called Barsabbas (also known as Justus) and Matthias. Then they prayed, “Lord, you know everyone’s heart. Show us which of these two you have chosen to take over this apostolic ministry, which Judas left to go where he belongs.” Then they cast lots, and the lot fell to Matthias; so he was added to the eleven apostles.

(This is the word of the Lord – **Thanks be to God**)

Second Reading - 1 John 5:9-13

We accept man's testimony, but God's testimony is greater because it is the testimony of God, which he has given about his Son. Anyone who believes in the Son of God has this testimony in his heart. Anyone who does not believe God has made him out to be a liar, because he has not believed the testimony God has given about his Son. And this is the testimony: God has given us eternal life, and this life is in his Son. He who has the Son has life; he who does not have the Son of God does not have life. I write these things to you who believe in the name of the Son of God so that you may know that you have eternal life.

(Reader:This is the word of the Lord - **Thanks be to God**)

Gospel Reading - John 17: 6-19

“I have revealed you to those whom you gave me out of the world. They were yours; you gave them to me and they have obeyed your word. Now they know that everything you have given me comes from you. For I gave them the words you gave me and they accepted them. They knew with certainty that I came from you, and they believed that you sent me. I pray for them. I am not praying for the world, but for those you have given me, for they are yours. All I have is yours, and all you have is mine. And glory has come to me through them. I will remain in the world no longer, but they are still in the world, and I am coming to you. Holy Father, protect them by the power of your name—the name you gave me—so that they may be one as we are one. While I was with them, I protected them and kept them safe by that name you gave me. None has been lost except the one doomed to destruction so that Scripture would be fulfilled.

“I am coming to you now, but I say these things while I am still in the world, so that they may have the full measure of my joy within them. I have given them your word and the world has hated them,

for they are not of the world any more than I am of the world. My prayer is not that you take them out of the world but that you protect them from the evil one. They are not of the world, even as I am not of it. Sanctify them by the truth; your word is truth. As you sent me into the world, I have sent them into the world. For them I sanctify myself, that they too may be truly sanctified (Reader: This is the Word of the Lord – **All: Thanks be to God**)

Post Communion Prayer

Eternal God, giver of love and power, your Son Jesus Christ has sent us into all the world to preach the gospel of his kingdom: confirm us in this mission, and help us to live the good news we proclaim; through Jesus Christ our Lord. **Amen**

Commentary: Christ's Followers or Leaders?

One of the underlying themes of today's readings is community and some of the elements which are to be present in our broad Christian community. We are called to be an integral part of the world and community in which we live, and, as a body of believers we are to be united and perhaps most importantly we are to be holy and sanctified. All these themes are interlinked. As we love one another so God dwells in us and as He dwells in us so we become holy and sanctified and empowered to go out into the community to show God's love and transforming power. In so doing, we each take on in our individual ways, a mantle of leadership. We are called to be Christ's followers but we are also called to be His leaders, just as Matthias was and the passage from Acts reminds us of the importance of Christian leadership.

In a world which generally lacks leadership and direction Christians need to be seen as credible, engaged and respected community leaders and participants. People who can be change agents, prepared to challenge the status quo, people with passion involved in a wide spectrum of roles working for the benefit of the wider community. Above all, people who focus on people and enabling them achieve their full, God given, potential. In short, the church must demonstrate that it understands the most important challenge facing it in the twenty first century is not the debate around sexuality or any of the other internal or peripheral issues which consume so much of the church's time, but how it can engage in leading and transforming the communities in which it exists through demonstrating a Christ like fervour, humility and compassion for them. Our words and actions must be encountered as a movement impelled by the profound understanding that Christ and His message of hope and salvation are as relevant in today's society as they have ever been. The church is uniquely placed to serve and respond to those who are seeking support and a moral compass in their lives, through the absolute truths of scripture, the holy mystery of faith and worship and the sure and certain hope we have in Christ. It can only do so effectively if we follow His example of leading, challenging and serving the communities in which we live, like Him prepared to interact with and challenge the political, religious and social leaders of the day, humbly and compassionately engaging with people from all aspects of society. Within the Partnership serving the community is at the heart of much that we do. As churches we have a corporate responsibility to our community which we try to meet through encouraging and facilitating the various activities and groups who make use of our premises. But we also have an individual responsibility to make sure we are playing our own full role in those areas which God calls us to as individuals or smaller groups. This is part of God's calling on our lives.

In the gospel reading several words appear multiple times. 'Glorify', 'word', 'unity' or 'one', and 'world' are some examples. The 'world' is definitely a place to which Christ has been sent and into which the Apostles are to go. But 'world' also defines those people who refuse to accept Jesus as the Messiah and by that definition is moved to hatred of those who seek to make the Messiah and His purpose known. The disciples and believers today no longer belong to this 'world' group but belong in it as a gift from the Father, in the Son, empowered by His Spirit, to bring about the Kingdom of God in the present age. Gerald Darrington suggests that, '...Christians have been sent into the world to work within that world for the unveiling of beauty that is yet to be....' We are called to be Christ's leaders and followers so that God's rule may be known in our world and communities. It not just a job for others, we all have our part to play. Just as the early disciples were to learn, that can sometimes be hard and uncomfortable as we expose ourselves to the 'hatred' and indifference of the world. The disciples found that when they were united, when they were able to encourage each other, when they opened themselves up to the omnipotent power of the Spirit, they were able to stand in that world as a gift from God, and reflect a world transformed and renewed the way God intends His creation to be. *Sam Cappleman – some material taken from Sam's article published in the 'Church Times', September 2008*

Meditation

Jesus was to stay in the world no longer. He was about to travel through the narrow passageway of death, as we all will do one day, back into His Father's presence. He had given everything that He was and everything that He possessed to the Father. The disciples must have longed for things to stay as they were, with Jesus continuing to be with physically them, giving their lives new direction and meaning and a degree of security. But that was not to be. Life would never be completely the same again. Jesus prays that in this new world order that is about to be inaugurated that the disciples would be protected and secure, united and sanctified (set apart and made holy) for the work to which they would embark. We too are a holy people, protected and sanctified by the love of God for the work to which He has called us. He asks us in return to fully enter into that love and in so doing so we enter into unity with Him and each other.

Prayers for Sunday and week ahead

Saviour Christ, of ourselves we cannot love you, cannot follow you, cannot cleave to you; but you came down that we might love you; ascended that we might follow you, bound us round you as your girdle that we might be held fast to you. You loved us, so make us love you; you sought us, so make us seek you; you found us when we were lost, so be yourself the way, that we may find you and be found in you, our only hope and everlasting joy. **Amen**

Eternal God, the King of Glory, you have exalted your only Son with great triumph to your Kingdom in heaven. Leave us not comfortless, but send your Holy Spirit to strengthen us and exalt us to the place where Christ has gone before, and where with you and the Holy Spirit He is worshipped and glorified, now and for ever. **Amen**

We have a great high priest who has passed into the Heavens, Jesus the Son of God. **Amen**

Blessed are you, Lord God almighty, who gave your Son, Jesus Christ, to be our redeemer and the author of everlasting life; and exalted Him above all for ever; that at all times and in all places we might be partakers of His power and His glory. **Amen**

Almighty and ever-living God, give us new strength from the courage of Christ our shepherd, and lead us to join the saints in heaven, where he lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, for ever and ever. **Amen**

The God of all grace who called you to His eternal glory in Christ Jesus, establish, strengthen and settle you in the faith; and the blessing of God Almighty, the Father, the Son and the Holy Spirit be among you and remain with you always. **Amen**

Beating the Parish Bounds – an Ascension Day Tradition

The three days immediately before Ascension Day, which was on Thursday this week, are sometimes know as Rogation Days. The word comes from the Latin 'rogare', meaning to ask, and these were the days when God's blessing was asked on the crops, planted a few weeks earlier and hopefully just beginning to show signs of life in the early Spring. The custom came from Europe where it was initiated by the Archbishop of Vienna in the year 470 after terrible plagues and minor earthquakes had devastated the community. He ordered special prayers to be recited as the villagers processed around their fields asking God blessing on their crops. The custom spread rapidly around Western Europe, and by the eighth century was established in Britain. These processions were also useful to show people their parish boundaries, boundaries. The custom of 'Beating the Bounds' grew up to show people, and especially the younger members of the parish, where the parish boundaries lay. At the boundary-marks of the parish such as a pond, a big tree or a rock, the country vicar or parson would stop and read the Gospel, and when this had been done the boys of the parish traditionally was thrown over a hedge, pushed into a stream or beaten with willow wands to imprint the boundary on their minds. These willow wands come from the straight suckers of a pollarded willow. Stripping the soft bark from the outside revealed the beautifully smooth white wood of new willow and it is from this action of removing the bark that we get the title of the country dance 'Strip the Willow'.

Churches see hopeful future for nuclear disarmament

Three British Churches have expressed optimism following the conclusion of the nuclear Non-Proliferation Treaty (NPT) Preparatory Committee meeting in New York. Leaders of the Baptist Union of Great Britain, the Methodist Church and the United Reformed Church are hopeful that real progress towards global disarmament will be made over the next 12 months in the run-up to the NPT Review Conference in 2010.

However, the Church leaders expressed their disappointment that the UK Government continues to support the replacement of Trident, Britain's nuclear weapons system, while also participating in global disarmament discussions.

"I am alarmed by the Government's inconsistency," said the Revd Jonathan Edwards, General Secretary of the Baptist Union of Great Britain. "How can it promote disarmament on the one hand, but be in favour of retaining British nuclear weapons on the other? We want to see all decisions on the replacement of Trident put on hold until after the 2010 Review Conference."

Revd John Marsh, Moderator of the United Reformed Church General Assembly, said: "New nuclear weapons will cost the British tax-payer billions of pounds. Given that we are already struggling financially, and facing a massive burden of debt, this is particularly obscene. We urge the Government to think again. Parliament must have the opportunity to reconsider major spending in the light of the constraints on the UK economy and the progress on disarmament."

Steve Hucklesby, Policy Adviser for The Methodist Church, added: "World leaders now have the best chance in years to make positive steps towards total nuclear disarmament. We need decisive leadership to make it happen. Nuclear weapons are totally immoral as their possession implies a willingness to commit mass murder."
