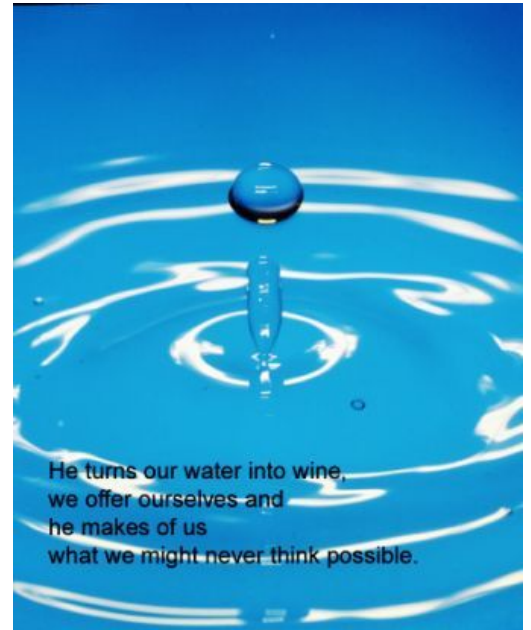
Epiphany 3

Opening Verse -Matthew 18: 18-20

'Truly I tell you, whatever you bind on earth will be bound in heaven, and whatever you loose on earth will be loosed in heaven. Again, truly I tell you, if two of you agree on earth about anything you ask, it will be done for you by my Father in heaven. For where two or three are gathered in my name, I am there among them.'

Collect Prayer -Before we read we pray

First Bible Reading – Genesis 14: 17-20

After Abram returned from defeating Kedorlaomer and the kings allied with him, the king of Sodom came out to meet him in the Valley of Shaveh (that is, the King's Valley). Then Melchizedek king of Salem brought out bread and wine. He was priest of God Most High, and he blessed Abram, saying, "Blessed be Abram by God Most High, Creator of heaven and earth. And blessed be God Most High, who delivered your enemies into your hand." Then Abram gave him a tenth of everything.

(Reader: This is the word of the Lord – **Thanks be to God**)

Second Reading - Revelation 19: 1-10

Then I heard what sounded like a great multitude, like the roar of rushing waters and like loud peals of thunder, shouting: "Hallelujah! For our Lord God Almighty reigns. Let us rejoice and be glad and give him glory! For the wedding of the Lamb has come, and his bride has made herself ready. Fine linen, bright and clean, was given her to wear." (Fine linen stands for the righteous acts of the saints.) Then the angel said to me, "Write: 'Blessed are those who are invited to the wedding supper of the Lamb!' " And he added, "These are the true words of God." At this I fell at his feet to worship him. But he said to me. "Do not do it! I am a fellow-servant with you and with your brothers who hold to the testimony of Jesus. Worship God! For the testimony of Jesus is the spirit of prophecy."

(Reader: This is the word of the Lord - **Thanks be to God**)

Third Reading - John 2: 1-11

On the third day a wedding took place at Cana in Galilee. Jesus' mother was there, and Jesus and his disciples had also been invited to the wedding. When the wine was gone, Jesus' mother said to him, "They have no more wine." "Dear woman, why do you involve me?" Jesus replied, "My time has not yet come." His mother said to the servants, "Do whatever he tells you." Nearby stood six stone water jars, the kind used by the Jews for ceremonial washing, each holding from twenty to thirty gallons. Jesus said to the servants, "Fill the jars with water"; so they filled them to the brim. Then he told them, "Now draw some out and take it to the master of the banquet." They did so, and the master of the banquet tasted the water that had been turned into wine. He did not realize where it had come from, though the servants who had drawn the water knew. Then he called the bridegroom aside and said, "Everyone brings out the choice wine first and then the cheaper wine after the guests have had too much to drink; but you have saved the best till now." This, the first of his miraculous signs, Jesus performed in Cana of Galilee. He thus revealed his glory, and his disciples put their faith in him.

Reader: This is the word of the Lord—**Thanks be to God**

Mediation

John indicates that the miracle at Cana was the first of the miraculous signs which Jesus performed and which He has just promised Nathaniel that he would do. Some people see these signs as imaginary stories passed on to illustrate some hidden and deeper truth. And whilst it's true that it is always possible to read scripture at a number of different levels with different depths of meaning we should not lose sight of the fact that the signs in John's gospel are times when the heavenly and earthly realms intersect with each other, just as they do in Christ Himself. They are not some kind of mythical story recorded to encourage the early believers, or ourselves, when times are hard. They are there to help us see the reality of what happens when heaven breaks through on earth.

Commentary A New Beginning

The miracle of turning the water into wine at Cana is only reported in John's gospel where he places it at the beginning of Jesus' ministry. He says that it was the first of the seven signs performed by Jesus and through it He 'revealed His glory and His disciples put their faith in Him'. It's because of this revelation of His glory that the episode at Cana, together with the visit of the Magi and Christ's baptism, came to be associated with Epiphany. In the Middle Ages, the miracle at Cana and the revelation of Christ's glory there came to be celebrated by itself on the second Sunday after Epiphany. There are no exact Old Testament parallels with this story but it echoes the story of Moses getting water from a rock, making the bitter water sweet and of turning water to blood. Echoes and stories with which the hearers and readers of the story would be familiar. Water and wine are familiar elements to us today in our worship and resonate with the meaning of this story. Indeed in the service of Holy Communion many churches mix water and wine together in the chalice. This practice is not to dilute the wine, but is a symbol of the unity of the human and divine natures in the person of Christ.

It is this meeting of the earthly and the heavenly realms, which comes to its crux at the cross, which is at the centre of the reading from John today. The wedding feast is a foretaste of the heavenly banquet to which all believers are invited. The water jars which are used for the Jewish purification rituals that are filled with the water that is turned into wine are a sign that God is doing a new thing, bringing purification not just to Israel but to the whole world in a new way. In last week's reading Jesus has just told Nathanael that he will see '...heaven open and the angels of God ascending and descending over the son of man'. Jacob's dream in Genesis 28 v 10 – 17 will be fulfilled in the Son of Man, and especially when he is lifted up. Later in his gospel John tells us that Nathanael comes from Cana so it's perhaps not surprising that Jesus moves onto Cana shortly after his exchange with Nathanael, nor is it surprising that we see an interception of heaven and earth in the story of the wedding there. Throughout his gospel, John makes extensive use of the words 'up' and 'down', *ano* and *kato* in Greek. For John, these words mean more than different levels in a physical sense but are used to illustrate the sense of two different orders. The *kato* order is the order of the world and self, the *ano* order is the order of God's Kingdom where the ruling principle is not self but God's love. Nathanael will see the reality of Jacob's dream where the humanity of the world is carried up to God through Jesus and the presence of God is brought down to earth through His Son in his own village at a wedding feast. Given John's use of the words up and down, when they appear in his gospel they give us some insight as to what is happening or about to happen. In the reading today it is the water jars that are filled up. Something will happen to the water as the up meets the down, as the substance of the earth meets with the transforming touch of the substance of heaven. And that's exactly what happened. In this case there were six jars not seven, the imperfect number bit the perfect. The old imperfect way must pass away and be transformed by the new. And so the water is transformed into wine, not just any old wine but the best wine the people had ever tasted. The new world order that was to follow the old was to be immeasurably better than the one that was passing away. It's also important to see that in order for the transformation to be complete not only had the water to be transformed into wine it had to be drawn out and experienced by others. The parallels with our own lives are clear. We are to be transformed by the touch of God in our lives, as our earthly natures are exposed to the heavenly nature of our God who is incarnate through Christ. Our

'down' is to be transformed into His 'up' by His coming 'down' to us and being raised 'up'. But not only are we to have our very nature transformed by His touch, we are to share that transformation with others so that they too can experience the touch of heaven and be transformed themselves.

The miracle takes place on the third day. A relatively short time later there would be another third day. That day would see the ultimate power of God breaking through when heaven and earth intersected in a way that would change the history of the world for eternity. In the same way the transformation of the water into wine at the wedding at Cana in Galilee, and the transformation which is continually taking place in our own lives, are only a pallid foretaste of the ultimate transformation which is still to come.
