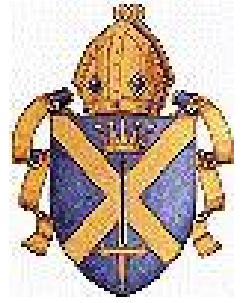

Luke 9:51-62

Old Testament Bible Reading 1 Kings 19 v 15 – 16, 19 - 21

The LORD said to him, Go back the way you came, and go to the Desert of Damascus. When you get there, anoint Hazael king over Aram. Also, anoint Jehu son of Nimshi king over Israel, and anoint Elisha son of Shaphat from Abel Meholah to succeed you as prophet. So Elijah went from there and found Elisha son of Shaphat. He was ploughing with twelve yoke of oxen, and he himself was driving the twelfth pair. Elijah went up to him and threw his cloak around him. Elisha then left his oxen and ran after Elijah. Let me kiss my father and mother good-bye, he said, and then I will come with you. Go back, Elijah replied. What have I done to you? So Elisha left him and went back. He took his yoke of oxen and slaughtered them. He burned the ploughing equipment to cook the meat and gave it to the people, and they ate. Then he set out to follow Elijah and became his attendant. (This is the word of the Lord -- **Thanks be to God**)

Epistle Reading Galatians Chapter 5:1,13-25

It is for freedom that Christ has set us free. Stand firm, then, and do not let yourselves be burdened again by a yoke of slavery. As for those agitators, I wish they would go the whole way and emasculate themselves! You, my brothers, were called to be free. But do not use your freedom to indulge the sinful nature ; rather, serve one another in love. The entire law is summed up in a single command: "Love your neighbour as yourself." 15 If you keep on biting and devouring each other, watch out or you will be destroyed by each other. So I say, live by the Spirit, and you will not gratify the desires of the sinful nature. For the sinful nature desires what is contrary to the Spirit, and the Spirit what is contrary to the sinful nature. They are in conflict with each other, so that you do not do what you want. But if you are led by the Spirit, you are not under law. The acts of the sinful nature are obvious: sexual immorality, impurity and debauchery; idolatry and witchcraft; hatred, discord, jealousy, fits of rage, selfish ambition, dissensions, factions and envy; drunkenness, orgies, and the like. I warn you, as I did before, that those who live like this will not inherit the kingdom of God. But the fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness and self-control. Against such things there is no law. Those who belong to Christ Jesus have crucified the sinful nature with its passions and desires. Since we live by the Spirit, let us keep in step with the Spirit (Reader This is the Word of the Lord, **All: Thanks be to God**)

Gospel Reading Luke 9:51 -62

As the time approached for him to be taken up to heaven, Jesus resolutely set out for Jerusalem. And he sent messengers on ahead, who went into a Samaritan village to get things ready for him; but the people there did not welcome him, because he was heading for Jerusalem. When the disciples James and John saw this, they asked, "Lord, do you want us to call fire down from heaven to destroy them?" But Jesus turned and rebuked them, and they went to another village. As they were walking along the road, a man said to him, "I will follow you wherever you go." Jesus replied, "Foxes have holes and birds of the air have nests, but the Son of Man has no place to lay his head." He said to another man, "Follow me." But the man replied, "Lord, first let me go and bury my father." Jesus said to him, "Let the dead bury their own dead, but you go and

proclaim the kingdom of God." Still another said, "I will follow you, Lord; but first let me go back and say good-bye to my family." Jesus replied, "No one who puts his hand to the plough and looks back is fit for service in the kingdom of God."

Commentary 'On a Mission'

It's clear from the gospel reading today that Jesus is on a mission. His determination to achieve what He sets out to is visible to all; He rebukes the disciples in one place, in another suggests to a potential follower that he let '...the dead bury their own dead...' and in another He says that no-one who looks back is fit for service in the Kingdom of God. Harsh words, but He is determined that He will not be swayed, deflected, delayed or distracted from His intense desire to get to Jerusalem. The need to go to Jerusalem is burning within Him and the only way to extinguish that fire is to go there. We are at a turning point in the gospel. The Galilean ministry is over and for the next 10 chapters Luke focuses on the Journey to Jerusalem. A journey that will end with Jesus fulfilling His identity as Priest, Prophet, King and Saviour. As He sets out, He knows what reaching the destination will ultimately mean, but He is resolute in His determination to fulfil the mission He has been sent by the Father to complete. To the three would be followers of Jesus He lays out the principles of following the way of God, almost speaking to Himself as much as to them, as He highlights the tensions between the call of the world and all it offers and the call of God and the need for perseverance in fulfilling the work of the Father. And through this dialogue we are left in no doubt, Jesus, quite literally, is a man on a mission.

We see a similar single mindedness in the readings from 1 Kings and Galatians. In the Old Testament reading we see Elisha 'assuming the mantle' or cloak of Elijah. Not only does he leave his plough and oxen, he slaughters the oxen and burns the plough so that he can cook the meat and offer it to the people there. For Elisa there could be no going back now! Similarly in Paul's letter to the Galatians we see a single mindedness of Paul which characterises much of his writings. Galatia was a larger Roman province, stretching from coast to coast in what is now Turkey. Galatians is one of the earliest pieces of New Testament writing we have. It's one of Paul's earliest letters, if not the earliest and in it we see the zeal and passion he has for promoting a correct understanding of the gospel, so that the early believers would not set off on the wrong track. Paul had visited Galatia earlier and after that visit it appears that some other Jewish-Christians had also visited. They seemed to have been teaching that in addition to repentance and faith, it was still necessary to be circumcised and observe the Jewish law in order to receive God's forgiveness and be free to live a new life. Paul was livid, and not surprisingly Galatians is the most strongly worded of all of his letters. What made Paul so cross was that this erroneous teaching destroyed the concept of salvation through faith and everything that freedom in Christ meant. That is why Paul crudely states that the people who are teaching this doctrine should go further than just circumcising themselves! Paul stresses that the only focus that the early believers should have is on the love of Christ and what that meant for themselves and for their community. To lead lives that were focused on serving God and each other, summing up the law in the single command of 'Love your neighbour as yourself'. Paul also warns the early believers that they should not misunderstand this new found freedom in Christ. For some there must have been a temptation to swing the pendulum the other way after being limited under the strictures of Jewish law and cast off all restraint, and to be tempted to lead the debauched ways of the Roman's they lived side by side with in Galatia, whose lax and immoral lifestyle was visible for all to see. The way of life that Paul exhorts the early believers to is the way of the cross, the way of Christ, the way of the Spirit, the way of love.

Walking in the way of the Spirit requires that same determination that Christ demonstrates as He heads towards Jerusalem. Paul makes it clear that the old way of life with its sinful desires and passions has been crucified with Christ for all who believe and belong to Him and therefore as believers we are called to live the life empowered and enabled by God's Holy Spirit. But it's easy to get deflected from the path of walking with the Spirit as the old desires and behaviours crowd in on us day by day. Each time we do, we need to acknowledge our position and simply step back on the path and in that same determined way as Christ who is the author and perfecter of our faith. *Sam Cappleman*

Methodists live longer than the average Brit

Last Sunday, Stanley Lucas of Cornwall died aged 110 (born on 15 January, 1900). Stanley was thought to be not only the oldest male member of the British Methodist Church, but one of the oldest men in the world.

Is this sort of longevity characteristic of Methodists? Seemingly, yes. An analysis of family announcements printed in the Methodist Recorder carried out by British Religion in Numbers, hosted by Manchester University, shows that in 1973 the mean age of death for Methodist laity was 77.9 years for men and 83 for women. By 2008 these figures had risen to 83.9 and 91.1 respectively – well above the life expectancy for the UK population as a whole (77 for men and 82 for women). Dr Richard Vautrey, GP and Vice President of the Methodist Conference, said, "I'm sure there are many different factors at work for Methodists to attain these numbers. But I would guess that our emphasis on caring for our spiritual as well as physical health, avoiding excess, engaging with people in our communities and being good neighbours all help."

The position for male Methodist ministers is similar, with a mean age of death of 83.4 years for those whose obituaries appeared in the 2009 edition of the Minutes of the Annual Conference and Directory of the Methodist Church. And this is not a new pattern. Clive Field's unpublished Oxford DPhil thesis of 1974 revealed that, until the beginning of the twentieth century, the death rate per 1,000 among lay members of the various Methodist denominations in Britain was appreciably below the national level, especially in Wesleyan Methodism. Methodist commentators, both in the Victorian era and since, were quick to point out that the longevity of Methodists was not accidental. They posited a clear link between a religious, 'clean' and virtuous life on the one hand and a long one on the other. The avoidance of physical and moral excess was especially advocated. The Church's annual governing body, the Methodist Conference, is currently meeting in Portsmouth, and begins every year with singing "And are we yet alive?", a hymn by Charles Wesley.

St Mark's Church Council The Council met this week and agreed to the fitting of photovoltaic panels on the roof of the church. The system will cost £15,000 and is being funded from church finances. Planning and faculty permission has already been agreed and so the installation is due to take place in July. The reasoning behind the panels is two fold. Firstly, churches are being asked to examine their 'carbon footprint' and do whatever they can to develop green energy. The solar panels will generate electricity which can be used in the church centre. In the unlikely event that any electricity is unused this will be fed back into the national grid. The electricity saving is forecast to be a minimum of £400 per year at current rates. Secondly the government has introduced generous cash incentives meaning that the system fitted at St Mark's will attract a guaranteed funding of £1,300 per year for the next 25 years. This means that the system will be paid for in less than nine years and then be contributing to church funds. We have explored other micro energy projects such as a wind turbine but these are not currently viable.

New Window in upstairs room. I would like to say thank you to the church council for providing the new window in the upstairs office at St Mark's. It has been unbearably hot in this office without proper ventilation and we are all really grateful for the vast improvement which the new window has made *Delia*

Flowers from St Mark's For many years Putnoe Heights Church has distributed flowers to friends of the church. The flowers are removed from the displays around the church. These might be delivered on a special occasion, when somebody is poorly or bereaved. St Mark's would now like to implement the same activity and from this Sunday flowers will be removed from displays etc to be taken out into the community. The Leadership Team will be responsible for this and would appreciate being told anybody who would value this thoughtful gesture.

Near Miss? Last week the chapel at St Mark's was visited by a group of teenage girls who made a considerable mess with candles, wax etc. Obviously there was a real danger of a fire event. The CCTV system identified the offenders who were subsequently visited by the police. Please always be vigilant if you are around church premises and report any suspicious activity.

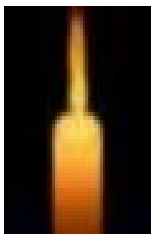

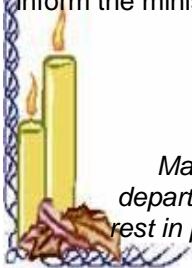
