"I will repay you for the years the locusts have eaten— the great locust and the young locust, the other locusts and the locust swarm— my great army that I sent among you. You will have plenty to eat, until you are full, and you will praise the name of the Lord your God, who has worked wonders for you; never again will my people be shamed.

Then you will know that I am in Israel, that I am the Lord your God, and that there is no other; never again will my people be shamed.

"And afterward, I will pour out my Spirit on all people. Your sons and daughters will prophesy, your old men will dream dreams, your young men will see visions. Even on my servants, both men and women, I will pour out my Spirit in those days. I will show wonders in the heavens and on the earth, blood and fire and billows of smoke. The sun will be turned to darkness and the moon to blood before the coming of the great and dreadful day of the Lord. And everyone who calls on the name of the Lord will be saved; for on Mount Zion and in Jerusalem

there will be deliverance, as the Lord has said, even among the survivors whom the Lord calls. (This is the word of the Lord — **Thanks be to God)**

Second Reading -Ephesians 4:1-16

As a prisoner for the Lord, then, I urge you to live a life worthy of the calling you have received.

Be completely humble and gentle; be patient, bearing with one another in love.

Make every effort to keep the unity of the Spirit through the bond of peace.

There is one body and one Spirit, just as you were called to one hope when you were called; one Lord, one faith, one baptism;

one God and Father of all, who is over all and through all and in all.

But to each one of us grace has been given as Christ apportioned it. This is why it says:

'When he ascended on high,

he took many captives

and gave gifts to his people.'

(What does 'he ascended' mean except that he also descended to the lower, earthly regions? He who descended is the very one who ascended higher than all the heavens, in order to fill the whole universe.)

So Christ himself gave the apostles, the prophets, the evangelists, the pastors and teachers, to equip his people for works of service, so that the body of Christ may be built up until we all reach unity in the faith and in the knowledge of the Son of God and become mature, attaining to the whole measure of the fullness of Christ.

Then we will no longer be infants, tossed back and forth by the waves, and blown here and there by every wind of teaching and by the cunning and craftiness of people in their deceitful scheming. Instead, speaking the truth in love, we will grow to become in every respect the mature body of him who is the head, that is, Christ.

From him the whole body, joined and held together by every supporting ligament, grows and builds itself up in love, as each part does its work.

Gospel Reading - Luke 18:9-14

To some who were confident of their own righteousness and looked down on everybody else, Jesus told this parable: "Two men went up to the temple to pray, one a Pharisee and the other a tax collector. The Pharisee stood up and prayed about himself: 'God, I thank you that I am not like other men--robbers, evildoers, adulterers--or even like this tax collector. I fast twice a week and give a tenth of all I get.' "But the tax collector stood at a distance. He would not even look up to heaven, but beat his breast and said, 'God, have mercy on me, a sinner.' "I tell you that this man, rather than the other, went home justified before God. For everyone who exalts himself will be humbled, and he who humbles himself will be exalted (This is the Word of the Lord— **Thanks be to God**)

Commentary The Parable of the Pharisee and the Tax Collector:

The two characters represent positions at opposite ends of the social and spiritual scale. The Pharisee is respectable, the tax collector despised. The Pharisee stands to pray, the tax collector stood "afar off." The Pharisee recounts his accomplishments, the tax collector knows he needn't bother. The Pharisee begins by thanking God for having made him such a swell person, not like "others." He recounts his spiritual achievements, which include such laudable acts as double fasting and tithing on the entirety of his possessions. Quite obviously therefore set in its original context, the first hearers of this story would have expected the Pharisee, not the tax-collector, to be held up as a role model.

Today we find the Pharisee's self-righteousness irritating, but in his day, he would have been honoured for his piety. His extra fasting and his tithing would have placed him as a devout man and his attendance at prayer would have been regarded as an outward sign of his undoubted inner spirituality. In stark contrast, the tax-collector is seen as unworthy and would have been vilified for his work and collaboration with the Romans. Yet in his prayerful attitude and contrite words, in acknowledging his own failings, he is held up as an example of reliance upon God's mercy. God's mercy is part of the Divine Nature which reaches out to all who acknowledge their need and then seeks to heal that broken relationship. God is not a God impressed with pious acts and feelings of superiority. He is rather, a God of mercy who responds to the needs and honest prayers of people.

However the parable is less about prayer than it is about attitudes towards self and neighbour. The parable raises the question of how our assessment of people compares with that of God. It is common practice for us to judge other people as being somehow inferior to ourselves. We commit a sin of comparison and this is far from the mind of God. In excluding others we are actually excluding ourselves. Somehow it's not easy to admit our brokenness or its impact on others. It takes humility to acknowledge how we need to change to bring life and healing to our world and relationships. Unfortunately arrogance is far easier and far more common in our world. Even in the quest for justice, it is all too easy to become self-righteous and judgemental of those we must challenge or oppose. The parable goes to the heart of the matter: there is danger in self-righteousness and self-aggrandisement, and there is life to be found when we evaluate ourselves clearly, soberly and with humility.

The role of arrogance in creating injustice in our world is twofold. Firstly, injustice comes through the attitudes that society holds toward the 'greatest' and the 'least'. On the one hand, the poor and vulnerable are seen to be responsible for their own problems. They are thought to be lazy, weak and ignorant and so in some way they are thought to have deserved what life has given them. On the other hand, the powerful and wealthy believe that they deserve what they have because they are somehow better – be it wiser, harder working or whatever. Arrogance always robs the other of their humanity and dignity. Humility, on the other hand, results in an openness to the story of the other, to true compassion for the many complex causes of

their plight (many of which are beyond their control), and to a commitment to mutual care, learning and collaboration for the benefit of all. It is this humility which opens us to God's Spirit which works among us and in us as we serve one another, and which allows us to experience God's reign among us even now.


In the story the Pharisee and the tax collector represent two different responses to Jesus

- 1. Those who relied on their own righteousness and have hardened their hearts to Jesus
- 2. Those who recognise their own shortcomings and sinfulness and come seeking forgiveness and help to change their ways.

There has always been a tendency for Christians to be perceived as those who judge others, perhaps this has been unfair at times, but even when Christians seek to be compassionate we can come across as judgemental and "holier than thou." In difficult economic times there is always a bandwagon which gathers momentum and which blames the poor for their poverty, is inhospitable to immigrants, and seeks to limit things like health care and benefits. As Christians we have to make difficult decisions as to what we will say think how we will be heard, careful that we are mindful always of those who often through no fault of their own, find themselves struggling. The Gospel is most powerfully demonstrated when we are characterised not by hardness of heart but rather by humility and when we recognise that we have much to learn from those we seek to serve – even the poorest and weakest in our communities. It is this humility that drives us to our knees in prayer for God's empowering Spirit, that keeps us always mindful of our own shortcomings, failings and blind spots, and that opens our eyes to the signs of God's Reign that always precede our work in any place or time. *Charles Royden*

Meditation

The icon also shows the state of both men as they leave the temple. Following the words of Christ in Luke 18:14, the Publican has now been exalted in the kingdom of God because of his humility. He leaves the temple forgiven, and he shows that he remains open to the will of God. In contrast, the Pharisee leaves the temple unjustified, still in need of forgiveness. Because of his pride and lack of repentance, he will be humbled before God, the One who knows the condition of each person's soul and who will offer the gift of salvation to those who come to Him in true repentance.



Prayers for Sunday and the Week Ahead


