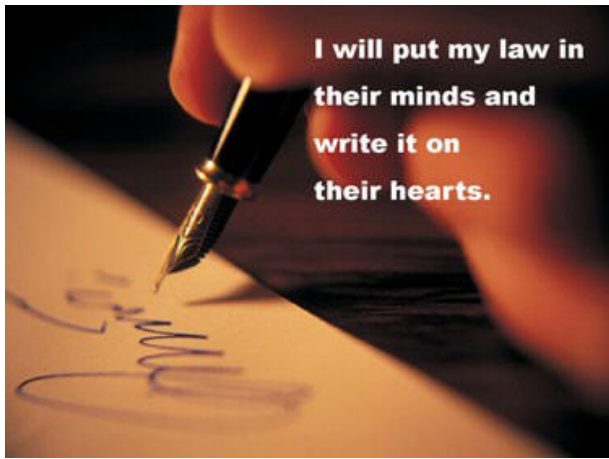

Fifth Sunday in Lent

Opening Verse –Psalm 51:10

Create in me a pure heart, O God, and renew a steadfast spirit within me

Collect Prayer *Before we read we pray*

Almighty God, your Son came into the world to free us all from sin and death. Breathe upon us with the power of your Spirit, that we may be raised to new life in Christ, and serve you in holiness and righteousness all our days; through the same Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

First Bible Reading – Jeremiah 31:31-34

"The time is coming," declares the LORD, "when I will make a new covenant with the house of Israel and with the house of Judah. It will not be like the covenant I made with their forefathers when I took them by the hand to lead them out of Egypt, because they broke my covenant, though I was a husband to them, " declares the LORD.

"This is the covenant I will make with the house of Israel after that time," declares the LORD. "I will put my law in their minds and write it on their hearts. I will be their God, and they will be my people. No longer will a man teach his neighbour, or a man his brother, saying, 'Know the LORD,' because they will all know me, from the least of them to the greatest," declares the LORD. "For I will forgive their wickedness and will remember their sins no more."

(Reader: This is the word of the Lord – **Thanks be to God**)

Second Reading - Hebrews 5:5-10

So Christ also did not take upon himself the glory of becoming a high priest. But God said to him, "You are my Son; today I have become your Father." And he says in another place, "You are a priest forever, in the order of Melchizedek." During the days of Jesus' life on earth, he offered up prayers and petitions with loud cries and tears to the one who could save him from death, and he was heard because of his reverent submission. Although he was a son, he learned obedience from what he suffered and, once made perfect, he became the source of eternal salvation for all who obey him and was designated by God to be high priest in the order of Melchizedek

(Reader: This is the word of the Lord – **Thanks be to God**)

Gospel Reading - John 12:20-33 **All: Glory to Christ our Saviour**

Now there were some Greeks among those who went up to worship at the Feast. They came to Philip, who was from Bethsaida in Galilee, with a request. "Sir," they said, "we would like to see Jesus." Philip went to tell Andrew; Andrew and Philip in turn told Jesus.

Jesus replied, "The hour has come for the Son of Man to be glorified. I tell you the truth, unless a kernel of wheat falls to the ground and dies, it remains only a single seed. But if it dies, it produces many seeds. The man who loves his life will lose it, while the man who hates his life in this world will keep it for eternal life. Whoever serves me must follow me; and where I am, my servant also will be. My Father will honour the one who serves me.

"Now my heart is troubled, and what shall I say? 'Father, save me from this hour'? No, it was for this very reason I came to this hour. Father, glorify your name!" Then a voice came from heaven, "I have glorified it, and will glorify it again." The crowd that was there and heard it said it had thundered; others said an angel had spoken to him.

Jesus said, "This voice was for your benefit, not mine. Now is the time for judgment on this world; now the prince of this world will be driven out. But I, when I am lifted up from the earth, will draw all men to myself." He said this to show the kind of death he was going to die.

(Reader: This is the Gospel of Christ– **All: Praise to Christ our Lord**)

Post Communion Prayer Almighty God, you see that we have no power of ourselves to help ourselves: keep us outwardly in our bodies, and inwardly in our souls; that we may be defended from all adversities which may happen to the body and from all evil thoughts which may assault and hurt the soul; through Christ our Lord. Amen

Commentary

Jeremiah's prophesy in the Old Testament reading is fulfilled with the coming of Jesus. With Jesus there in person people can see and understand what God is like and with God's Spirit poured into their hearts after Pentecost the new and intimate relationship with God becomes a reality for all.

After Jesus had cleansed the temple Greeks came seeking him and it is as if he catches sight of the future when all nations will come and all people of all nations will give Glory to God and worship him. What a glorious vision! But at the same time, Jesus recognises that his own finger is on the button that will make it possible. He is only too aware of what it involves - the agony he must suffer, and his humanity shrinks from it. He battles, he really does, with the instinct we all have to preserve ourselves and avoid pain. Being God's Son didn't mean it was all an easy ride for him!

But love triumphs and Jesus surrenders everything to the will and glory of God. He chose to go through hell, giving up everything including his life, so that we could be set free to live. This is how William Barclay sums it all up:

"It was Jesus' claim that, when he was lifted up, He would draw all men unto Him. There are some who take this to refer to the Ascension, and who think that it means that when Jesus was exalted in His risen power, He would draw all men unto Him. But that is far from the truth. Jesus was referring to His Cross—and the people knew it. And once again – inevitably – they were moved to incredulous astonishment. How could anyone possibly connect the Son of Man and a Cross? Was not the Son of Man the invincible leader at the head of the irresistible armies of heaven? What had the Son of Man and a cross to do with each other? Was not the Kingdom of the Son of Man to last for ever? "His dominion is an everlasting dominion, which shall not pass away, and His kingdom that which shall not be destroyed." (*Daniel 7: 14*).

Was it not said of the prince of the golden age: My servant David shall be their prince for ever?" (*Ezekiel 37: 25*) Had Isaiah not said of the ruler of the new world: "Of the increase of his government and peace there shall be no end"? (*Isaiah 9: 7*). Did the Psalmist not sing of this endless kingdom? "Thy seed will I establish for ever, and build up thy throne to all generations" (*Psalm 89: 4*)

The Jews connected the Son of Man with an everlasting kingdom, and here was He, who claimed to be the Son of Man, talking about being lifted up upon a Cross. Who was this Son of Man, whose Kingdom was to end before it had begun? But the whole lesson of history is that Jesus was right. It was on the magnet of the Cross that Jesus pinned His hopes. And Jesus was right because love will live long after might and power and force is dead. *Richard Ledger*

Churches challenge G20 leaders on real leadership

Baptist, Methodist and United Reformed Church leaders have challenged the G20 heads of government, meeting in London next week, to show real leadership and ensure that solutions to the current economic crisis lead to action on global warming. They want the G20 nations to grasp the opportunity for investment in new technology, which will save energy and reduce carbon output. In particular, they are urging the richer nations to agree generous support for developing countries, so they can afford the initiatives they need to take. The three Churches have already urged the European Union to adopt stronger measures on global warming. Some European leaders have resisted any further burden on industries at this time and have argued that the priority should be on restoring growth. The Church leaders say, in a globalised world, if growth is to be 'green', countries must make binding commitments. One key area could be emission targets for new cars, as a condition of manufacturers obtaining state support.

In a joint statement, they add: "The health of any economy cannot be measured solely on economic indicators such as growth, debt and employment. Climate change has the potential to disadvantage millions in the developed world and in developing nations. The G20 leaders must not allow the economic crisis to divert us from tackling this challenge. This is precisely the right time to be making concrete commitments on low-carbon growth."

Senior representatives of the Churches attended an ecumenical service at Methodist Central Hall, Westminster, immediately before the summit on Saturday 28 March and joined the march from Victoria Embankment to the rally at Hyde Park.

The following is set for consideration today March, Rise Up, The Church Worldwide

Thought What does the financial crisis tell us about the values at the core of our global systems and structures? As the Church we have the blueprint for a world based on its creator's values: on mercy, justice and humility. Do we not have a responsibility to raise a voice and reach out a hand so that our world better reflects his model?

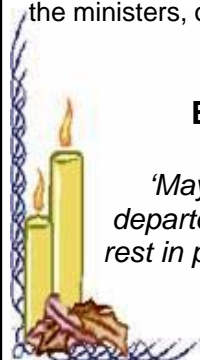
