Introduction

Jesus made a promise to his disciples, he was going to leave them but he would not leave them alone. After he had gone he would send the Holy Spirit to be present with them and the Holy Spirit would be like Jesus himself living alongside them. This was a bold promise, if the promise failed to come true the disciples would feel isolated and abandoned and be unable to face the challenges which Jesus had entrusted to them. However if Jesus was as good as his word then the disciples would feel able to conquer the world. With Jesus alongside them in their mission there was nothing of which they need be afraid.

Of course we know from the history books that this is exactly what happened. After Pentecost, when the Holy Spirit came to the disciples, they became fearless in their proclamation of Jesus and they took the message of Good news right across the world. The same Holy Spirit lives with God's people today, reassuring us of the presence of God with us. Although Jesus is not physically present, he is with us and shares with us in all that we do.

First Bible Reading - Acts 17:22-31

Paul then stood up in the meeting of the Areopagus and said: “Men of Athens! I see that in every way you are very religious. For as I walked around and looked carefully at your objects of worship, I even found an altar with this inscription: TO AN UNKNOWN GOD. Now what you worship as something unknown I am going to proclaim to you. “The God who made the world and everything in it is the Lord of heaven and earth and does not live in temples built by hands. And he is not served by human hands, as if he needed anything, because he himself gives all men life and breath and everything else. From one man he made every nation of men, that they should inhabit the whole earth; and he determined the times set for them and the exact places where they should live. God did this so that men would seek him and perhaps reach out for him and find him, though he is not far from each one of us. ‘For in him we live and move and have our being.’ As some of your own poets have said, ‘We are his offspring.’ “Therefore since we are God's offspring, we should not think that the divine being is like gold or silver or stone—an image made by man's design and skill. In the past God overlooked such ignorance, but now he commands all people everywhere to repent. For he has set a day when he will judge the world with justice by the man he has appointed. He has given proof of this to all men by raising him from the dead.”

(This is the Word of the Lord — **Thanks be to God**)

Second Reading - 1 Peter 3: 13-22

"Who is going to harm you if you are eager to do good? But even if you should suffer for what is right, you are blessed. "Do not fear what they fear; do not be frightened. "But in your hearts set apart Christ as Lord. Always be prepared to give an answer to everyone who asks you to give the reason for the hope that you have. But do this with gentleness and respect, keeping a clear conscience, so that those who speak maliciously against your good behaviour in Christ may be ashamed of their slander. It is better, if it is God's will, to suffer for doing good than for doing evil. For Christ died for sins once for all, the righteous for the unrighteous, to bring you to God. He was put to death in the body but made alive by the Spirit, through whom also he went and preached to the spirits in prison who disobeyed long ago when God waited patiently in the days of Noah while the ark was being built. In it only a few people, eight in all, were saved through water, and this water symbolizes baptism that now saves you also—not the removal of dirt from the body but the pledge of a good conscience toward God. It saves you by the resurrection of Jesus Christ, who has gone into heaven and is at God's right hand—with angels, authorities and powers in submission to him. (This is the Word of the Lord — **Thanks be to God**)

Gospel Reading - John 14: 15-21

"If you love me, you will obey what I command. And I will ask the Father, and he will give you another Counsellor to be with you forever—the Spirit of truth. The world cannot accept him, because it neither sees him nor knows him. But you know him, for he lives with you and will be in you. I will not leave you as orphans; I will come to you. Before long, the world will not see me anymore, but you will see me. Because I live, you also will live. On that day you will realize that I am in my Father, and you are in me, and I am in you. Whoever has my commands and obeys them, he is the one who loves me. He who loves me will be loved by my Father, and I too will love him and show myself to him." Commentary

Commentary 29 May 2011

The book of Acts is one of my favourite books in the Bible, as its title indicates it is full of accounts of the bold actions of those first brave men and women, living in the 1st century, who were prepared to stand up and be counted for their faith in God as revealed to them, in the person of their friend and teacher, Jesus. Living in the 21st century we might do well to reflect on whether we are as brave in standing up for Jesus. I'm not sure I am, or would be if put to tests such as those early disciples were and as faced by many thousands of Christians across the world today.

In Acts 17 verses 22 – 31 we read, what are probably extracts from a much longer speech, Paul made during his missionary journey to Greece, speaking in Athens, to people who liked nothing better than to 'talk and listen to the latest ideas' (17:21). He was taken there by a group of Epicurean and Stoic philosophers to the place where a council met, 'Areopagus' (Greek for 'Mars Hill'), in order to explain his new teaching. This would seem to be an ideal location to explain and expand on his 'new' understanding of the nature of God. When reading this passage it is helpful to have some knowledge of those Paul was addressing:

'Epicureans taught that one should pursue fulfilment and actively avoid displeasure and that the role of gods in a person's life was seen as strictly marginal'.

Stoics thought that one attained fulfilment by accepting the course of events, including pain and suffering. These should be endured quietly and almost gratefully, since they are part of nature and

are controlled by an impersonal divine necessity or fate'. (*New Bible Commentary*) Some have argued that, by referring to the altar 'to an unknown God' (v23) and quoting from a pagan poet 'We are his offspring' (v 28), Paul's teaching in Athens was a failure so he changed his style when he moved on to the next city Corinth. Others consider his speech to have been a 'very strong Jewish attack on the smug complacency of the Athenians'. By drawing on his knowledge of the local culture Paul was able to point out their failings more clearly. The altar 'To an unknown God' resulted from a legend that when there was a terrible plague in Athens, after attempts to appease the gods had failed, a wise man took a flock of sheep to the top of 'Mars Hill' and released them. Wherever these sheep stopped an altar was set up and the animal sacrificed. This action allegedly had the desired affect and the plague ended. At the beginning of this speech Paul's comments on the Athenians religious practises could be taken as either positive or negative: 'Men of Athens! I see that in every way you are very religious'. He then goes on to point out that the God he proclaims is not bound by man made objects, however He is willing to overlook their ignorance as long as they give up the worship of idols and look to the risen Lord who is the proof they seek. A relevant message for us today as we try to explain our beliefs in a Living God in our own local context and culture, where many people prefer to put their trust in such things as 'healing stones', the acquisition of objects; or creating a new image of themselves. *Wendy Waters*

Meditation Finding God in all things

One of the hardest battles in the spiritual life, perhaps I should say the hardest, is the struggle to see God in our trivial human happenings. How often we have to renew our act of faith! At first we are tempted to see only ourselves, to believe only in ourselves to value only ourselves. Then gradually we perceive that the thread of life has a rationale, a mysterious unity, and we are led to think that we meet God in its basic stages. Then again, as our religious experience grows, we begin to realize that we meet God not only in the big events of our lives but in all the events, however small and apparently insignificant. God is never absent from our lives. He cannot be, because 'in him we live, and move, and exist' (Acts 17:28). But it requires so much effort to turn this truth into a habit! We need repeated acts of faith before we learn to sail with confidence on the immense and endless sea' which is God (*St Gregory of Nazienzen*), knowing I that if we founder we do so in him, the divine, eternal, ever-present God. How fortunate we are if we can learn to navigate our frail craft on the sea and remain serene even when the storm is raging! *Carlo Carretto, Love is for Living,*

From Deacon Jane

Dear All I've been out of town for a while, on Saturday 14th I was leading a workshop at the Diocesan conference on 'spirituality in residential care homes' and last week I was at 'Diaconal Convocation', the annual gathering of the whole of the Methodist Diaconal Order, of which I am an ordained member.

We met over four days at the Hayes conference centre in Swanwick, Derbyshire, so I thought I'd share with you an outline of what we did in that time.

Day one: 'gathering our community'; in which we gathered to worship, welcoming new candidates and remembering those of our number who have died in the past year, discuss the business of our committees and any reports we need to send to Methodist conference or to any of the ecumenical groups to which we belong, and heard from both the President and Vice-President of the Methodist Conference.

Day two: 'nourishing our community'; in which we engaged with bible studies, discussed issues of 'safeguarding ourselves', had 'team-building' sessions and space to retreat and/or meet with our area groups or year groups.

Day three: 'equipping our community'; in which we had more bible study, speakers on issues affecting the life of our order and the wider church, including Ann Morisy, and a choice of workshops focussing on different 'specialist' areas of our ministry (with certain age groups, in different areas, using music).
Day four: 'Dispersing our community'; in which we had (you guessed it) more bible study and ended with worship which included both the rededication of each of us and our blessing of those due to be 'received into full connexion' and/or ordained at Methodist conference this year.

It was a busy yet fulfilling time, it is always good to meet up with friends and there is something almost comforting about being among people who are in a similar situation to yourself. It is good to be back, I am generally a practical person, happiest when I am doing the work to which I am called, and hopefully I

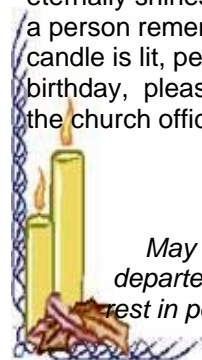
