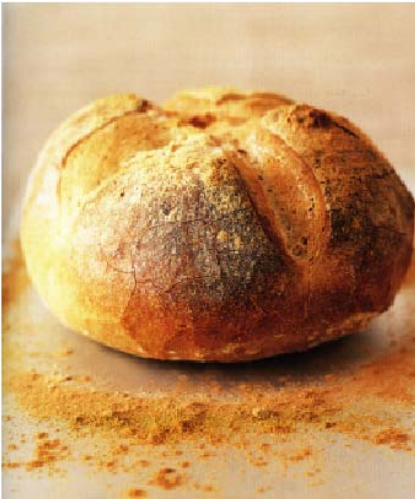

First Bible Reading - Amos 6: 1a & 4 - 7

Woe to you who are complacent. You lie on beds inlaid with ivory and lounge on your couches. You dine on choice lambs and fattened calves. You strum away on your harps like David and improvise on musical instruments. You drink wine by the bowlful and use the finest lotions, but you do not grieve over the ruin of Joseph. Therefore you will be among the first to go into exile; your feasting and lounging will end.

Second Bible Reading - 1 Timothy 6 : 6 -19

But godliness with contentment is great gain. For we brought nothing into the world, and we can take nothing out of it. But if we have food and clothing, we will be content with that. People who want to get rich fall into temptation and a trap and into many foolish and harmful desires that plunge men into ruin and destruction. For the love of money is a root of all kinds of evil. Some people, eager for money, have wandered from the faith and pierced themselves with many griefs. But you, man of God, flee from all this, and pursue righteousness, godliness, faith, love, endurance and gentleness. Fight the good fight of the faith. Take hold of the eternal life to which you were called when you made your good confession in the presence of many witnesses. In the sight of God, who gives life to everything, and of Christ Jesus, who while testifying before Pontius Pilate made the good confession, I charge you to keep this command without spot or blame until the appearing of our Lord Jesus Christ, which God will bring about in his own time--God, the blessed and only Ruler, the King of kings and Lord of lords, who alone is immortal and who lives in unapproachable light, whom no one has seen or can see. To him be honour and might forever. Amen. Command those who are rich in this present world not to be arrogant nor to put their hope in wealth, which is so uncertain, but to put their hope in God, who richly provides us with everything for our enjoyment. Command them to do good, to be rich in good deeds, and to be generous and willing to share. In this way they will lay up treasure for themselves as a firm foundation for the coming age, so that they may take hold of the life that is truly life.

Gospel Reading - Luke 16: 19 - 31

(After the Gospel is announced—Glory to Christ our Saviour)

"There was a rich man who was dressed in purple and fine linen and lived in luxury every day. At his gate was laid a beggar named Lazarus, covered with sores and longing to eat what fell from the rich man's table. Even the dogs came and licked his sores. "The time came when the beggar died and the angels carried him to Abraham's side. The rich man also died and was buried. In hell, where he was in torment, he looked up and saw Abraham far away, with Lazarus by his side. So he called to him, 'Father Abraham, have pity on me and send Lazarus to dip the tip of his finger in water and cool my tongue, because I am in agony in this fire.' "But Abraham replied, 'Son, remember that in your lifetime you received your good things, while Lazarus received bad things, but now he is comforted here and you are in agony. And besides all this, between us and you a great chasm has been fixed, so that those who want to

go from here to you cannot, nor can anyone cross over from there to us.' "He answered, 'Then I beg you, father, send Lazarus to my father's house, for I have five brothers. Let him warn them, so that they will not also come to this place of torment.' "Abraham replied, 'They have Moses and the Prophets; let them listen to them.' "'No, father Abraham,' he said, 'but if someone from the dead goes to them, they will repent.' "He said to him, 'If they do not listen to Moses and the Prophets, they will not be convinced even if someone rises from the dead.'"

Post Communion Prayer

Lord of the harvest, with joy we have offered thanksgiving for your love in creation and have shared in the bread and the wine of the kingdom: by your grace plant within us a reverence for all that you give us and make us generous and wise stewards of the good things we enjoy; through Jesus Christ our Lord.

Commentary

Surely one of the most dramatic shifts in theological thinking over the last century has been in the area of man's relationship to the rest of the created world? Even the most nature-loving Victorian minister would have firmly believed that the natural world was created by God for humans to use and enjoy. In that kind of thinking, nature is a kind of supermarket in which humans can select and discard the bits of the planet they want to exploit or preserve. In that way of thinking, Man had superiority over animals, birds, plants and trees in the same way that he had over "inferior" people. That kind of view saw the created order as having a hierarchy with white Christian man at the very apex and everything and everybody beneath. The view was held that only humanity was made in God's own image, so that meant that humans had god-like power over on the planet. It is a brave person who would hold to such a theology in the twenty-first century. Just as our view of God has shifted away from visualising him as a stern Victorian father figure, so our sense of humans as the only species of importance has faded. We now see ourselves as a part of an interconnected creation: every part of which is precious and valuable in the eyes of our Creator. We now see the dangers in exploiting and abusing the world around us. We are beginning to observe the dangers of fouling our own nests. The warning signs of the consequences of polluting the environment have been clear from the end of the eighteenth century when Wesley published a little booklet pondering on the implications of dirty air and water for the health of the poor city dwellers. But we humans have been slow to read the signs and it has taken fear for the habitat of the rich white West to galvanise us into combating pollution and climate change.

The Gospel reading today reminds us of the social and spiritual dimension of consumption. In the story a rich man lived a heedless existence of luxury with no thought either of the poor people around him or the world to come. If he had been willing to share his resources, taken care of the poor, he might have saved his soul. In the story Jesus made it brutally clear that such careless consumption has a spiritual dimension. Every action in our lives, no matter how small, has an impact, upon ourselves, upon our neighbours, upon the planet and upon our relationship with God. This should not make us paranoid but help us remember that we are important to God and related to the world around us. Joan Crossley

Meditation

Those of you who read the Blogg on our church website by The Reverend Ross Royden will already have read his comments on the Lord's Supper/Eucharist/Communion/Mass. Ross uses the quotation by Calvin shown below which is worth printing here for our thoughts—

'Now, if anyone should ask me how this takes place, I shall not be ashamed to confess that it is a secret too lofty for either my mind to comprehend or my words to declare. And, to speak more plainly, I rather experience than understand it. Therefore, I here embrace without controversy the truth of God in which I may safely rest. He declares his flesh the food of my soul, his blood its drink [John 6:53ff.]. I offer my soul to him to be fed with such food. In his Sacred Supper he bids me take, eat, and drink his body and blood under the symbols of bread and wine. I do not doubt that he himself truly presents them, and that I receive them.' (Institutes, Book IV, CH. XVII, paragraph 32)
