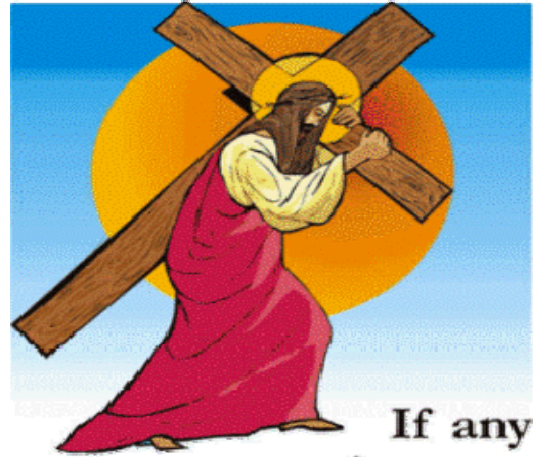

First Bible Reading Exodus 3: 1-15

Now Moses was tending the flock of Jethro his father-in-law, the priest of Midian, and he led the flock to the far side of the desert and came to Horeb, the mountain of God. There the angel of the LORD appeared to him in flames of fire from within a bush. Moses saw that though the bush was on fire it did not burn up. So Moses thought, "I will go over and see this strange sight—why the bush does not burn up." When the LORD saw that he had gone over to look, God called to him from within the bush, "Moses! Moses!" And Moses said, "Here I am." "Do not come any closer," God said. "Take off your sandals, for the place where you are standing is holy ground." Then he said, "I am the God of your father, the God of Abraham, the God of Isaac and the God of Jacob." At this, Moses hid his face, because he was afraid to look at God. The LORD said, "I have indeed seen the misery of my people in Egypt. I have heard them crying out because of their slave drivers, and I am concerned about their suffering. So I have come down to rescue them from the hand of the Egyptians and to bring them up out of that land into a good and spacious land, a land flowing with milk and honey—the home of the Canaanites, Hittites, Amorites, Perizzites, Hivites and Jebusites. And now the cry of the Israelites has reached me, and I have seen the way the Egyptians are oppressing them. So now, go. I am sending you to Pharaoh to bring my people the Israelites out of Egypt." But Moses said to God, "Who am I, that I should go to Pharaoh and bring the Israelites out of Egypt?" And God said, "I will be with you. And this will be the sign to you that it is I who have sent you: When you have brought the people out of Egypt, you ^[a] will worship God on this mountain." Moses said to God, "Suppose I go to the Israelites and say to them, 'The God of your fathers has sent me to you,' and they ask me, 'What is his name?' Then what shall I tell them?" God said to Moses, "I am who I am . ^[b] This is what you are to say to the Israelites: 'I AM has sent me to you.' " God also said to Moses, "Say to the Israelites, 'The LORD, ^[c] the God of your fathers—the God of Abraham, the God of Isaac and the God of Jacob—has sent me to you.' This is my name forever, the name by which I am to be remembered from generation to generation.

Second Reading Romans 12:9-21

Love must be sincere. Hate what is evil; cling to what is good. Be devoted to one another in brotherly love. Honour one another above yourselves. Never be lacking in zeal, but keep your spiritual fervour, serving the Lord. Be joyful in hope, patient in affliction, faithful in prayer. Share with God's people who are in need. Practice hospitality. Bless those who persecute you; bless and do not curse. Rejoice with those who rejoice; mourn with those who mourn. Live in harmony with one another. Do not be proud, but be willing to associate with people of low position. Do not be conceited. Do not repay anyone evil for evil. Be careful to do what is right in the eyes of everybody. If it is possible, as far as it depends on you, live at peace with everyone. Do not take

revenge, my friends, but leave room for God's wrath, for it is written: "It is mine to avenge; I will repay, says the Lord. On the contrary: "If your enemy is hungry, feed him; if he is thirsty, give him something to drink. In doing this, you will heap burning coals on his head." Do not be overcome by evil, but overcome evil with good. (Reader: This is the word of the Lord -- Thanks be to God)

Gospel Reading Matthew 16:21-28

(When the Gospel is announced—Glory to Christ our Saviour)

From that time on Jesus began to explain to his disciples that he must go to Jerusalem and suffer many things at the hands of the elders, chief priests and teachers of the law, and that he must be killed and on the third day be raised to life. Peter took him aside and began to rebuke him. "Never, Lord!" he said. "This shall never happen to you!" Jesus turned and said to Peter, "Get behind me, Satan! You are a stumbling block to me; you do not have in mind the things of God, but the things of men." Then Jesus said to his disciples, "If anyone would come after me, he must deny himself and take up his cross and follow me. For whoever wants to save his life will lose it, but whoever loses his life for me will find it. What good will it be for a man if he gains the whole world, yet forfeits his soul? Or what can a man give in exchange for his soul? For the Son of Man is going to come in his Father's glory with his angels, and then he will reward each person according to what he has done. I tell you the truth, some who are standing here will not taste death before they see the Son of Man coming in his kingdom (Reader: This is the word of the Lord - Thanks be to God)

Commentary

Exodus 3: 1-15

We would be amazed to see a bush on fire, but to Moses it would not have been so unusual; it happens in dry areas where you get lightning strikes.

On this occasion Moses takes a second look at the familiar and has a decisive encounter with God.

Perhaps we should look for this too: an 'ordinary' service or conversation could change our lives!

5 points to ponder

- 1 God called Moses by name. He knows us.
- 2 God knew the situation of the Israelites. He knows ours too.
- 3 God has plans for the people. He has plans for us.
- 4 God told Moses; "So now go". He calls us to follow him.
- 5 God said "I will be with you". He promises to be with us.

There are echoes of Matthew 28: 18-20.

Jesus said "All authority in heaven and on earth has been given to me. Therefore go and make disciples of all nations, baptising them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit. And surely I am with you always, to the very end of the age."

We know that existence is not the same as living. The difference is a bit like that between black and white and colour T.V. You see the same sort of picture - but there really is no comparison! In our gospel reading from Matthew 16 Jesus gives his recipe for life as distinct from existence.

William Barclay makes three points:

- 1 The person who 'plays for safety' loves life. Life becomes a soft thing when it might have been an adventure; a selfish thing when it might have been radiant with service.
- 2 The person who risks all - and maybe looks as if he has lost all - for Christ, finds life.

3 We cannot get life back again. In every decision we are making ourselves a certain kind of person - building up a certain kind of character. It is possible to gain all we have set our hearts on only to discover that we have missed the most important things of all.
As the hymn says "Love, so amazing, so divine, demands my soul, my life, my all" *Richard Ledger*

Meditation

Jesus said "My command is this; love one another as I have loved you."

From heaven you came, helpless babe, entered our world, your glory veiled;
not to be served but to serve, and give Your life, that we might live.

News

The journal of one of the original leaders of Methodism, Charles Wesley, has been transcribed by the Revd Professor Kenneth Newport, Pro-Vice-Chancellor at Liverpool Hope University. The journal sheds new light on Wesley's life, and on his relationship with his brother, John, which was at times tempestuous. Professor Newport has spent count-less hours over the past ten years deciphering Wesley's short-hand code in the journal, which was written between 1736 and 1756. He carried out the work at the John Rylands University Library in Manchester, where the Methodist archive is on permanent deposit. The journal chronicles disagreements between the brothers, about the future direction of the Methodist societies — which Charles was adamant should remain within the Church of England — and the importance of lay preaching and the sacraments, among other things. Charles wrote: "I am for Church first, and then Method-ism."

The journal also reveals a pact the brothers had that neither would marry without the other's approval; and Charles's opposition to John's proposed marriage. He wrote: "He is insensible of both his own folly and danger, and of the divine goodness in so miraculously saving him."

Charles speculated that the disputes with his brother had contributed to his wife Sally's miscarriage. John, he wrote, had "cast poison into the cup of temporal blessings".

He also writes of the allegations of sexual misconduct during a missionary trip to Georgia in the United States — allegations that he always vehemently denied.

Professor Newport said the journal helped to make Charles Wesley more real. "I think there is a sanitised hagiographical view of Charles Wesley; so it is helpful to see how even he struggled with his faith at times in the day-to-day life of the 18th century, and found solace and strength in the divine.

"He had trials and tribulations, and it's quite helpful to have this portrait of Charles Wesley rather than this saintly, halo-endowed individual."

Toby Scott, a spokesman for the Methodist Church, agreed that the journal brought out the preacher's human side. The negative allegations were "nothing new", he said.

Professor Newport's task was made easier when he found part of the Authorised Version of the Bible in Wesley's highly idiosyncratic short-hand. Professor Newport, who is also Associate Priest of St Peter's, Bolton, was aided in the editing of the 1000-page manuscript by S. T. Kimbrough Jr, an author from the United States.
