Ordinary 10 Year A (Green)

Methodist Worship

First Reading – Hosea 5:15—6:8

Then I will go back to my place until they admit their guilt. And they will seek my face; in their misery they will earnestly seek me."

"Come, let us return to the LORD. He has torn us to pieces but he will heal us; he has injured us but he will bind up our wounds. After two days he will revive us; on the third day he will restore us, that we may live in his presence. Let us acknowledge the LORD; let us press on to acknowledge him. As surely as the sun rises, he will appear; he will come to us like the winter rains, like the spring rains that water the earth." "What can I do with you, Ephraim? What can I do with you, Judah? Your love is like the morning mist, like the early dew that disappears. Therefore I cut you in pieces with my prophets, I killed you with the words of my mouth; my judgments flashed like lightning upon you. For I desire mercy, not sacrifice, and acknowledgment of God rather than burnt offerings. Like Adam, they have broken the covenant-- they were unfaithful to me there. Gilead is a city of wicked men, stained with footprints of blood. (This is the word of the Lord—**Thanks be to God**)

Second Reading - Reading Romans 4:13-25

It was not through law that Abraham and his offspring received the promise that he would be heir of the world, but through the righteousness that comes by faith. For if those who live by law are heirs, faith has no value and the promise is worthless, because law brings wrath. And where there is no law there is no transgression. Therefore, the promise comes by faith, so that it may be by grace and may be guaranteed to all Abraham's offspring--not only to those who are of the law but also to those who are of the faith of Abraham. He is the father of us all. As it is written: "I have made you a father of many nations." He is our father in the sight of God, in whom he believed--the God who gives life to the dead and calls things that are not as though they were. Against all hope, Abraham in hope believed and so became the father of many nations, just as it had been said to him, "So shall your offspring be." Without weakening in his faith, he faced the fact that his body was as good as dead--since he was about a hundred years old--and that Sarah's womb was also dead. Yet he did not waver through unbelief regarding the promise of God, but was strengthened in his faith and gave glory to God, being fully persuaded that God had power to do what he had promised. This is why "it was credited to him as righteousness."

The words "it was credited to him" were written not for him alone, but also for us, to whom God will credit righteousness--for us who believe in him who raised Jesus our Lord from the dead. He was delivered over to death for our sins and was raised to life for our justification.

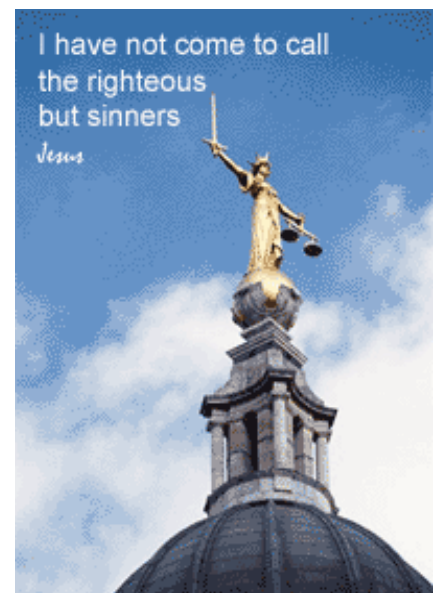

Gospel Reading Matthew 9:9-13 & 18-26

The Calling of Matthew

As Jesus went on from there, he saw a man named Matthew sitting at the tax collector's booth.

"Follow me," he told him, and Matthew got up and followed him. While Jesus was having dinner at Matthew's house, many tax collectors and "sinners" came and ate with him and his disciples. When the Pharisees saw this, they asked his disciples, "Why does your teacher eat with tax collectors and 'sinners'?" On hearing this, Jesus said, "It is not the healthy who need a doctor, but the sick. But go



and learn what this means: 'I desire mercy, not sacrifice.' For I have not come to call the righteous, but sinners."

Jesus Questioned About Fasting

Then John's disciples came and asked him, "How is it that we and the Pharisees fast, but your disciples do not fast?" Jesus answered, "How can the guests of the bridegroom mourn while he is with them? The time will come when the bridegroom will be taken from them; then they will fast. "No one sews a patch of unshrunk cloth on an old garment, for the patch will pull away from the garment, making the tear worse. Neither do men pour new wine into old wineskins. If they do, the skins will burst, the wine will run out and the wineskins will be ruined. No, they pour new wine into new wineskins, and both are preserved."

A Dead Girl and a Sick Woman

While he was saying this, a ruler came and knelt before him and said, "My daughter has just died. But come and put your hand on her, and she will live." Jesus got up and went with him, and so did his disciples. Just then a woman who had been subject to bleeding for twelve years came up behind him and touched the edge of his cloak. She said to herself, "If I only touch his cloak, I will be healed." Jesus turned and saw her. "Take heart, daughter," he said, "your faith has healed you." And the woman was healed from that moment. When Jesus entered the ruler's house and saw the flute players and the noisy crowd, he said, "Go away. The girl is not dead but asleep." But they laughed at him. After the crowd had been put outside, he went in and took the girl by the hand, and she got up. News of this spread through all that region.

Commentary

When Jesus calls Matthew to follow him, Jesus is ignoring the social norms of his day. The Jewish people despised tax-men. Now none of us much likes a tax-collector, but in Jesus day they worked for the Romans who were the occupying power and thus were doubly hated. This was because the tax-collectors not only exploited their position by taking more money than they should, but they also gave some of their revenue to the Roman authorities. So according to the vast majority of Jewish people, a tax-collector was to be socially shunned, marginalised and hated. But Jesus refuses to be swayed by these accepted attitudes. Jesus goes one step further in breaking these boundaries of accepted decency by having a meal with tax-collectors and an assortment of people categorised as "sinners". These people are not defined in any way, but we are given the distinct impression that the Pharisees at least do not approve of the company that Jesus shares a meal with. Sharing a meal was a customary way of showing hospitality and welcome to your guests. It was not the done thing to show this kind of hospitality to "sinners".

But Jesus is not going to be bound by these accepted values of his time and he steps over these boundaries and by his actions and words, he says that what has gone before is no longer valid, it no longer stands. Jesus declares that the new values of the Kingdom of God, which he is inaugurating, are different from what has gone before. Central to this theme of breaking boundaries is the quotation from Hosea Chapter 6 verse 6, "I require mercy, not sacrifice." Jesus is presenting a perspective on life which has its foundation in the Prophetic tradition of the Old Testament. The Prophets were constantly challenging the values and views of their society. They were constantly proclaiming the word of God to each generation and time and time again, the people did not listen to what was being said to them. Jesus is presented to his audience, as standing as the last in line of these great prophets, proclaiming the true word of God to his generation and beyond to us today. The pattern is the same, Jesus challenges the values and views of first Century Jewish religion and society, but they fail to hear him. Jesus also challenges the values and assumptions of our society today, but do we fail to hear him? In addition, at times it is our duty as Christians, to challenge the values and assumptions of modern society in the name of Christ. Most of the time people will not want to hear what we have to say.

Here the mercy that Jesus requires in the name of God is the kind of mercy which does not exclude others, it does not condemn those who are innocent and it is about putting people and the real situations that they are in above legal a legalistic interpretation of the faith. Jesus had

expressed his acceptance of sinners by eating with them and recommends mercy as a pattern for the living of our lives. Thus we are encouraged to accept those who are sometimes shunned by society and to show mercy to others. This indeed may be a challenge not only to the values and assumptions of society, but may also deeply challenge our own too. *Neil Bramble-Chapman*

Meditation

For I desire mercy, not sacrifice, and acknowledgment of God rather than burnt offerings
Hosea 6:6.

Jesus quotes these words from Hosea in the passage from Matthew today. He did so in response to criticism concerning the company which he kept. The book of Hosea tells of how the prophet Hosea became a living lesson on what the mercy of God was like. Hosea married a prostitute named Gomer and despite her unfaithfulness, bearing children from other men, nevertheless Hosea never failed to show love and devotion and took back his wayward wife. The message was that this was how God behaved towards Israel. Israel behaved badly towards God, nevertheless he never stopped loving them. In Hebrew the word *Hesed*, or *Chesed* is used, it can be translated as “mercy,” “covenant faithfulness,” “kindness,” “loving kindness,” “steadfast love”—it’s all the same word. God was always utterly faithful, when the people of Israel were faithless. God would be hurt by Israel’s lack of fidelity but he could behave no differently because it is his nature to show mercy. *Charles Royden*

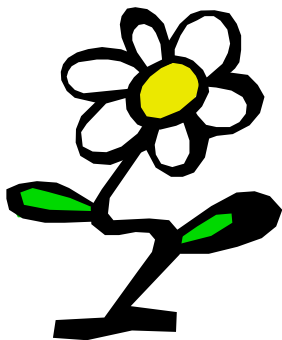

Anglican Methodist Relations

Two years ago, the Church of England's General Synod agreed by 91 per cent, and the Methodist Conference by 76 per cent, to approve the Covenant. The two churches also set up the Joint Implementation Commission which has now proposed radical changes.

Bishops It states that if Methodists accept the idea of bishops, then they should be consecrated by Church of England bishops.

At Holy Communion, individual cups used by Methodists for communion should be replaced by a single chalice, and Church of England wafers should be replaced by a single loaf. This might be the wrong way round! Methodists could still use wine from which the alcohol had been removed, but left over elements should be consumed after the service, following Anglican tradition.

On the issue of lay presidency, which happens in the Methodist Church, it argues that the Church of England has already accepted that such celebrations are valid by stating in the Anglican-Methodist Covenant that the sacraments in the Methodist Church are "duly administered and celebrated." Did somebody miss that I wonder?

The Churches had asked the JIC to consider, as a priority, whether clergy from each Church could fully take the place of their counterparts in the other Church. The report recognises that unrestricted interchangeability of ministers is the litmus test of whether ordinations performed by their Church are fully accepted by a partner Church. .

Rest In Peace
