Opening Verse - 1 Peter 1: 18

First Bible Reading - Acts 2: 14a, 36-41

Then Peter stood up with the Eleven, raised his voice and addressed the crowd: "Therefore let all Israel be assured of this: God has made this Jesus, whom you crucified, both Lord and Christ." When the people heard this, they were cut to the heart and said to Peter and the other apostles, "Brothers, what shall we do?" Peter replied, "Repent and be baptized, every one of you, in the name of Jesus Christ for the forgiveness of your sins. And you will receive the gift of the Holy Spirit. The promise is for you and your children and for all who are far off—for all whom the Lord our God will call." With many other words he warned them; and he pleaded with them, "Save yourselves from this corrupt generation." Those who accepted his message were baptized, and about three thousand were added to their number that day.

(This is the word of the Lord **All: Thanks be to God**)

Second Bible Reading—1 Peter 1: 17-23

Since you call on a Father who judges each man's work impartially, live your lives as strangers here in reverent fear. For you know that it was not with perishable things such as silver or gold that you were redeemed from the empty way of life handed down to you from your forefathers, but with the precious blood of Christ, a lamb without blemish or defect. He was chosen before the creation of the world, but was revealed in these last times for your sake. Through him you believe in God, who raised him from the dead and glorified him, and so your faith and hope are in God. Now that you have purified yourselves by obeying the truth so that you have sincere love for your brothers, love one another deeply, from the heart. For you have been born again, not of perishable seed, but of imperishable, through the living and enduring word of God.

(This is the word of the Lord - **All: Thanks be to God**)

Third Reading—Luke 24: 13-35

Now that same day two of them were going to a village called Emmaus, about seven miles from Jerusalem. They were talking with each other about everything that had happened. As they talked and discussed these things with each other, Jesus himself came up and walked along with them; but they were kept from recognizing him. He asked them, "What are you discussing together as you walk along?" They stood still, their faces downcast. One of them, named Cleopas, asked him, "Are you only a visitor to Jerusalem and do not know the things that have happened there in these days?" "What things?" he asked. "About Jesus of Nazareth," they replied. "He was a prophet, powerful in word and deed before God and all the people. The chief priests and our rulers handed him over to be sentenced to death, and they crucified him; but we had hoped that he was the one who was going to redeem Israel. And what is more, it is the third day since all this took place. In addition, some of our women amazed us. They went to the tomb early this morning but didn't find his body. They came and told us that they had seen a vision of

angels, who said he was alive. Then some of our companions went to the tomb and found it just as the women had said, but him they did not see.” He said to them, “How foolish you are, and how slow of heart to believe all that the prophets have spoken! Did not the Christ have to suffer these things and then enter his glory?” And beginning with Moses and all the Prophets, he explained to them what was said in all the Scriptures concerning himself. As they approached the village to which they were going, Jesus acted as if he were going farther. But they urged him strongly, “Stay with us, for it is nearly evening; the day is almost over.” So he went in to stay with them. When he was at the table with them, he took bread, gave thanks, broke it and began to give it to them. Then their eyes were opened and they recognized him, and he disappeared from their sight. They asked each other, “Were not our hearts burning within us while he talked with us on the road and opened the Scriptures to us?” They got up and returned at once to Jerusalem. There they found the Eleven and those with them, assembled together and saying, “It is true! The Lord has risen and has appeared to Simon.” Then the two told what had happened on the way, and how Jesus was recognised by them when he broke the bread.

Commentary By Wendy Waters

The book of Acts makes a good read, it is full of the ingredients that make for a gripping novel: heroes and villains, tragedy, intrigue, deception, miracles, feuds, camaraderie and much more. It has been said that we should not read Luke without going on to read Acts. The way the lectionary is set out today, we read Acts before Luke. In addition the reading from Acts takes place after Pentecost which we don't celebrate until the end of May and the first letter of Peter is estimated to have been written some 30 years after Jesus' death and resurrection. No matter there is much to be gained from careful study of all the readings.

'You can't tell them, they have to learn for themselves'. For those who are parents of young adults and not so young adults these words may ring a bell. I know, as my children have grown from children to adults in their mid to late twenties it has become increasingly necessary to hold my tongue about what they should, or should not, do in a wide range of situations and let them learn for themselves. Sometimes they have learnt the hard way and sometimes things have run more smoothly. Even though I might have the knowledge and or experience that might help them, they generally don't want advice unless they ask for it. As a parent seeing them learn the hard way is difficult. If you are not a parent you may be able recall times when your own parents might have been able to advise you on how to address a problem but you resisted it. Or perhaps you have listened to concerned parents who had to hold their tongue.

How God must have struggled to hold back as the Israelites went their own way time and time again until finally he sent His son to show them once and for all who he was how they were to live. But still many did not understand, resulting in the crucifixion of His son Jesus. In Acts there are recorded many speeches, or more likely summaries of speeches, by the disciples forcefully telling those who would listen the truth about Jesus and who he was. They did not hold back, they did not hold their tongues, they told them as it was, forcefully and explicitly.

In today's reading from Acts 2: 36 – 41 'post Pentecost' Peter, filled with the Holy Spirit, tells all Israel to "be assured of this: God has made Jesus, whom you crucified, both Lord and Christ". His bluntness 'cut them to the heart' and they asked him and the other apostles what they could do. He replied that they

must 'repent and be baptised'. He did not leave it at that he warned them and pleaded with them to 'save themselves from this corrupt generation'. The result was 3000 were baptised! It must be every Christian leaders dream to have such a response to their preaching and of course to some extent this does happen, usually at charismatic Evangelist's gatherings.

We too can find ourselves being drawn into being part of a 'corrupt generation'. It is easily done someone suggests it's alright to do something and we make excuses to ourselves why 'it will be alright just this once'. Then it is easier to do it just one more time and before we know it we regard it as an acceptable behaviour or action. All that is required to amend our ways is that we acknowledge before God where we have gone wrong, turn back from the path we are going down and allow the Holy Spirit to guide us forward.

Some 30 years after Pentecost in 1 Peter 1: 17 - 23 Peter was still reminding Christians of all ages and backgrounds, living in the area of what we know as Turkey, about how they should live differently from those around them who were not followers of Christ. Just as Peter urged those early Christians to 'live as strangers' so we to need to encourage and support one another in our struggles to live as Christ teaches us in this world, but not in such a way as to distance ourselves from those who might be in need of his Grace.

Meditation.

The recent drama on BBC1 'The Passion' was the latest in a series of attempts to portray the reality of the trial, crucifixion and resurrection of Jesus. It is tempting to be critical of the 'accuracy' of its content. A difficult task in itself as there are at least 4 different versions to base the script on! From my perspective it did convey the very human responses and reactions to the rapidly changing and alarming situations the disciples found themselves in.

In this drama the 'two on the road to Emmaus' were shown as two male disciples. However it has been suggested that they may have been a husband and wife Cleopas, as named in Luke, and his wife Mary. This possibility appeals to me, perhaps touching on my passion for inclusiveness within the family of the church. The image of a couple walking together, trying to unravel the meaning of recent bemusing events emphasises the human aspect of Jesus' life and death. Luke describes their faces as 'downcast' it is no wonder they are downcast after the person they had pinned their hopes on to release them from Roman oppression had died in a horrific manner and not only that his body had then disappeared. Even more puzzling that some had claimed to have seen him alive!

So it is that Jesus enters into the picture but is not recognised. In 'The Passion' the risen Jesus is played by a different actor until he 'breaks bread' at Emmaus. Then the couple recognise him through his actions. Many analogies have been drawn from this, including that his disciples failed to recognise events as God's redemption. We can, I suggest, by slowly reading the story, draw our own analogies, perhaps with our own spiritual journey. A journey when at times we may have needed more convincing of the truth of the Gospel; times when our downcast spirits have blinded us as to the presence of Jesus; then bringing us through to the times when our hearts have burned with the love of our Risen Lord. Spend time on this reading, absorb it, ponder on it, and be captivated by it and may it speak to you afresh. *Wendy Waters*

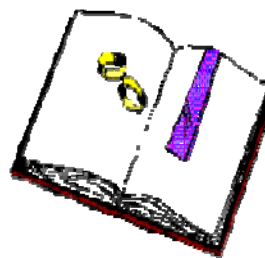
